PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Cup Over Company, \$14; The Victoria Co. Company \$10. The committee reported "no charge" in respect of the following, owing to their shortness: An Act to amend an Act to incorporate the Cardigan River Black Fox Company and an Act to amend an Act to incorporate the Dark River Patch Fox Company.

The House now resolved itself into committee (Chairman, Mr. Buntin) to take into consideration an Act to amend the Income Tax Act.

The PREMIER said that the object of the proposed amendment was to enable the Government to do justice in such cases where officers of the Government had not sufficient information to enable them to make out the list of income tax payers. The layas it stood required the schedules be made up complete on a certain date, and there was no provision by which any subsequently acquired information could be made available. He did not know how many people might be affected, or whether they would be affected, by this amendment, but it was for the purpose of enabling the Government to rectify any errors that might have been in the making up of the tax schedule.

The Bill was agreed to and ordered to a third reading.

Next, he considered by the House in committee (Chairman, Mr. Feehan) the School Supplies Act.

The PREMIER: The object of this Bill is to enable the Board of Education to carry out a programme which the Conservative party promised to undertake the procuring of school books and school supplies on the best possible terms and furnishing them to the schools at cost. The advantages to be derived from such a course will, I am confident, justify the present statute. I don't think it necessary to anticipate what the advantages will be, but I do believe that we shall be able to furnish supplies and books at a price less, if any, in excess of fifty per cent of the sums now paid. The prices of books have gone up high, and whoope to cut them down to something like one-half, and in most instances to get a better quality of book, to expect to get for 50 per cent of the present cost a better and more uniform standard of supplies. I think am stating the case quite fairly. The evidence that we have heard would entitle us to expect that the Superintendent of Education has spent a very great deal of time and has given as full attention as possible to the subject.

Mr. J. L. JENKINS said he would like to know what would be done in the case of very poor children in large families who could not possibly afford to get the books that were necessary but who were naturally clever. They had to suffer for the want of books, whereas, if they had the necessary supplies they would in many cases do very well. He knew of instances where children were kept at home because they had no books.

REAUDABLE PURPOSE

The PREMIER: That is a very pertinent question. What is the value of a system of education to those who are not able to take advantage of it? I may say that as one part of the scheme the Government will provide, free of cost, to every child unable to procure books every school book in the course; and we would not feel that we were opening up public schools to the use of all or citizens unless we were prepared to make that provision. I think this Legislature and the country will support the Government in carrying out this system upon that basis. Our desire is to make the schools as good as we can possibly make them. Our next desire, which is equal to that, is that we shall make them available to every child in the province; and the poorer the children are the more we should be prepared to do in order to render education available to them. The children of those who are better off may miss the opportunities that the public schools afford and later in life may to some extent overtake their lost time. For them we care far less than for those who have but the one chance; and our hope is that we shall have such an organization for the supply of school books that

there will be not a child here, however poor, who will not have placed within its reach the school supplies necessary to enable it to cope with the children of the best in the land.

Mr. L. L. JENKINS thought that that would be one of the means of keeping up the attendance. He knew that certain parents did not send their children to school because they had no books. But he thought that something ought to be done in the case of those who pretended to be too poor to buy books but who were really quite able to do so.

The PREMIER: That is a difficult matter, to know just who are poor and who are not when people claim to be poor. I think the mistake that we will make will be the mistake of giving the benefit of the doubt to those who claim to be unable to procure books.

The Bill, having been considered, was reported agreed to and ordered to a third reading.

On motion of the Premier the debate on the Budget was resumed. Mr. S. R. Jenkins, who adjourned the debate on the previous night, continuing.

MR. S. R. JENKINS' SPEECH

Mr. JENKINS said that he was speaking on education when he adjourned the debate on the previous night. He would repeat what he had said before, that the course of training given to teachers was too short; it was altogether too inadequate to give them that thorough education which was essential to their profession. For professions such as law, medicine, etc., the term required was five years, and they took up one branch of education. The teacher was to mould the character of the citizen for life and should therefore have a longer term of apprenticeship, as it were, to fit him for his profession, which the speaker thought was one of the greatest. The future conduct of the child depended to a great extent on the teacher. He thought that teachers were allowed to go out too young; they had gone out as young as sixteen. A young man of sixteen was not fit to teach the youth of the country and instil into him the necessary education. There were no two children alike in temperament and disposition, and it required a man of great experience and not a youth of sixteen to teach. A teacher could do a great deal of harm if he did not have a thorough knowledge of the individual character of his scholars. He thought also that the matter of technical education should be gone into on a larger scale than in the past. The curriculum as it existed today was too cobjons; there were too many subjects taught and not enough of a definite nature given. If education were made more technical, after a child had been given a rudimentary education, so that it would be fitted in some way for after life and be able to take up some particular branch of work that would enable him to earn a livelihood, it would be far better than trying to teach him a lot of subjects, which would mean afterwards that he would have a smattering of everything and a knowledge of nothing.
