(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Sept. 1.—Two swords which belonged to Gerard Lee Bevan, the ex-financier, who was sentenced eight months ago for fraudulent conversion and other offences in connection with the City Equitable Fire Insurance Company, has just been offered for sale by Messrs. Pattick and Simpson at the instance of the Trustee in Bankruptcy.

Robert Edward Edwards, an electrician, of Cardiff. They are first cousins, and were brought up together in Raver Street, Welshpool, Montgomeryshire, by their grandfather Edward Edwards of the Standard Quarry, Welshpool, a brother of the millionaire.

Fred of Simpson's Is Dead

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Sept. 1.—"Fred" a familiar figure to patrons of Simpson's in the Strand, near the Savoy where he was superintendant of the restaurant until his retirement a year ago, has died.

The announcement was made to customers a few days ago. His real name was William Charles Battersay, and the circumstances under which he became known as "Fred" are a mystery.

"There was another waiter at Simpson's called 'William,' and it is possible that in order to avoid confusion he became 'Fred,' was an explanation given at the restaurant by one of the staff.

He had been associated with Simpson's in the Strand for 47 years, joining the staff as a boy before the new building was erected and rose to be head waiter and later restaurant superintendant. His retirement was caused by ill-health, from which he never recovered.

In private life, in his younger days, "Fred" was a skilled oarsman.

Veterans Incensed

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Aug. 31.—Strong feeling has been aroused among members of the British Legion of ex-Service men at Swansea by the inclusion on the tablets of the local war memorial of the names of certain living aldermen, councillors and officials of the borough.

There are over 1,000 names on the memorial, and those to which exception is taken were prominent in the movement for the erection of the memorial.

The ex-Service men say that the memorial, which was recently unveiled by Admiral Sturdee, was for the dead, and not for the living. They declare that, if these names are not removed, they will cast the offending tablets into the sea.

A promise has been given that the War Memorial Committee shall be called together, when the chairman returns from Hull.

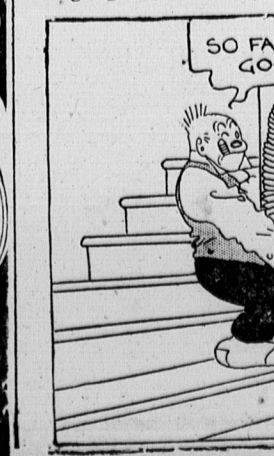
