THERE WERE DROWNED IN LUNENBURG

On Christmas Day While Parents Were to Church Broke Through Ice

HALIFAX, Dec 26-(Special)-Three children of Enos Venot of Lunenburg, were drowned in a pond near their parent's house yesterday.

The father and mother had gone to church but had warned the young folks not to skate during their absence. This they disobeyed.

When the parents returned the children were missing. Search was made and all three were found in the same hole in the ice.

Their ages were 23, 12 and 7 respectively.

SOMETHING NEW DONE BY ROBBERS CLEAN OUT A BAR

Gamblers Held Up And Forced To Hand Over Their Winnings.

CHICAGO, Dec. 25-Four masked men entered the saloon of William Knight last night and obtained \$100 in money, eight gold watches and four revolvers. The watches and currency were secured from five patrons of the saloon. The men were playing cards at tables when the visitors, each presenting a revolver entered. The players were persuaded to drop their game for the moment and line up at the bar, where two of the quartette accepted their contributions while the other two stood at present arms. After the ceremony one of the collectors went behind the bar and divested the cash register of its contents. Then the four left the saloon and escaped.

OLD MAN SHOT BY HIRED MAN AT BRAMPTON

His Son Disarms And Overpowers The Murderer After Fierce Struggle--The Son Was First Attacked By Assassin

BRAMPTON, Ont, Dec 26-(Special)-In going to the assistance of his son, James Curry, former reeve of Toronto township, William Curry, a man of 80 years and one of the best known residents of the township, was shot and killed in the closing hours of Christmas day by their hired man.

A fierce struggle followed the shooting between the hired man and James Curry, who succeeded in knocking the shot gun from the hands of the man and also wrenching a poker from his grasp.

Getting possession of the poker, James Curry struck the hired man over the head and the latter has not sufficiently recovered to be removed to jail here.

James Curry tells the following story: The three men had been sitting round the dining room stove when the old man retired.

"I guess I'll go to bed, too," said the hired man, rising from his chair, and stretching his arms in a yawn.

Then like a flash he picked up a gun that had been standing in the corner.

He flung an oath at the young man opposite as he trained the gun upon him.

"You laughed at me when we were fixing the pump the other day," he said. "It's my turn to laugh now."

"There's no use trying to bluff me with an empty gun," young Curry returned.

At that moment Curry senior appeared at the door, clad in his night clothes.

"Put down that gun! Don't make a fool of yourself," he cried to the hired man.

The hired man turned the gun on him, there was a flash and the old man fell, clutching at a terrible wound in his breast.

His form relaxed as he struck the floor and he died almost immediately.

Young Curry says the man immediately turned his attention again to him and attacked him with the gun.

They fell with Curry on top. There Curry beat the man into submission.

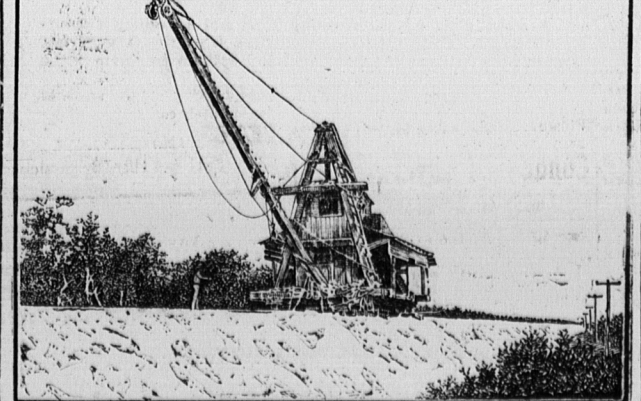
Executive Council Will Officially Deny That He Has Been Succeeded By Supreme Treasurer H.A. Collins - Supreme Court Called.

Toronto, Dec 25-"The Toronto members of the Executive Council of the Independent Order of Foresters will tomorrow issue an official denial of the report."

This was the reply of Mr W H Hunter the Supreme Counsellor of the Executive Council, when asked last night for a statement regarding the published report that Mr Elliott G Stevenson, the Supreme Chief Ranger, had tendered his resignation on Saturday and had been succeeded by Harry A. Collins, the Supreme Treasurer.

The Supreme Counsellor admitted there had been reports of the retirement of Mr. Stevenson in circulation, but he was authorized to say the statements lacked foundation.

Harry A. Collins when spoken to also denied the reports of the retirement of Mr. Stevenson.

MANY FATAL ACCIDENTS IN COBALT ONT

Mainly From Premature Explosion of Dynamite-Special Inquiry Is Ordered

Toronto, Dec. 26.-(Special)-During the past eleven months the number of fatal accidents in Cobalt have increased to such an alarming extent that the Government has ordered special inquiry to be made with a view of ascertaining the causes for the purpose of forming, if possible, preventative regulations.

The accidents have been due mainly to the premature or unexpected explosion of dynamite or gelignite.

HERCULANEUM WILL BE DUG OUT OF ITS ASHES

The Buried City Of Ancient Rome To Be Uncovered At Once

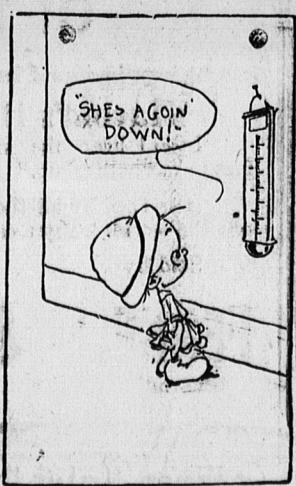
New York, Dec 25-A despatch, from Rome to the Times says the Italian Government announces that the excavation of the buried city of Herculaneum will begin at once.

The work will be carried out by the Italian Government with Italian funds and the advice of eminent archaeologists will be greatly accepted. Thus the proposal made by Professor Waldstein of Cambridge University that the excavations should be supervised by an international Commission is finally negotiated.
