This was our home for well onto two months. We ran out of tobacco, and were smoking for a substitute red willow bark, or "Kenik, kenik" as the Indians call it. One day, some Indians arrived, on their way to Hay River, and we were able to make a trade with them for some black twist, full of red pepper, but very acceptable never the less.

Our bill of fare consisted of bannock, bacon, and of course beans and fish. The fish we caught with some hooks I manufactured out of a piece of steel, and had no difficulty in getting all we wanted. We tried our hand at salting fish and laid by quite a store of them.

At last we saw the ice was starting to honeycomb in the bay, and beginning to break up into long needles, forming a mush. Then, one day, a strong wind sprang up, the ice started for the mouth of the McKenzie, and we saw boats following up the rear, with all sails set. We made haste to place our boat in the water, and starting to load it up, found it drawing too much water, so we proceeded to add buoyancy by adding a log on each side lashed on with ropes, and off we started for the McKenzie River.

At length we arrived at Hay River. Here I met a party I knew, who had come across from the head of the Peace River, and down Hay River, having portaged around a fall ninety feet high. They wanted me to join them, but I couldn't very well abandon my partner, so I did not take up the offer then.

OVIC BOND ISSUE — The issue of debentures authorized by the City Council was successfully disposed of this week. The issue was for \$35,000 for 20 years at five per cent. The proceeds were to repay bonds maturing this year \$15,500, to pay for relief money expended during the past year \$13,000, and for permanent work already expended in the repair of the City streets \$7,000. There were nine tenders received and the offer of the Dominion Securities Corporation, Ltd., Toronto, was accepted at 100.317, the next nearest tender being 100.26, and the lowest 98.60.

CONSIDERABLE ADVANCE IN NICKEL PRODUCTION

Nickel production in Canada during June and July advanced considerably over the totals for the corresponding months of 1932. The June production amounted to 8,050,726 pounds, and the July 9,237,576 pounds, the highest monthly outputs on record since May, 1931. Ozone As A Preservative

Ozone, a gas absolutely devoid of taste, thanks to its particular properties, plays an important part in the technique of preservation of foods, says the News Letter of the Dominion Dairy and Cold Storage Branch. It suppresses emanations and smells of all sorts, without leaving any trace. It is often said that the smell of ozone, somewhat similar to that of chlorine in weak concentration, only masks the other smells. This is not so. The effect of the ozone is to oxidize the foreign smells existing in the atmosphere and in the room, transforming the aromas into odourless and harmless smells. Ozone also has the remarkable property of killing the germs of the lower organisms, bacteria of putrefaction, fungi, et cetera. It not only prevents meats and like products from becoming viscous and mouldy, but also radically suppresses the bacteria which cause the damage.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 4—A code for United States housewives has been drafted by Judge M. Hartmann of the Court of Domestic Relations here, but it doesn't resemble the one by "Mrs. L.T.P. of Nederland, Tex., who urged, among other things, that wives be allowed to sleep late at least two days a week.

"Why," says Judge Hartmann, "the wife should arise at least one hour before the husband and have his pipe lit and his morning paper at hand for him.

"Except on Sunday, a husband is entitled to a hot, substantial dinner each night of the week. Cold cuts and sardines are taboo.

"A wife should find recreation in whatever form of entertainment her husband prefers, whether it be reading, music, the movies, golf or football.

"After giving 10 per cent of his salary to his wife for personal expenses, and paying the household bills, the husband is entitled to the balance—if any."

And, Judge Hartmann adds, the husband is entitled "to an affectionate welcome" on his return home at nights.

Seed Potato Blight

Blight in seed potatoes, it is stated, has been almost entirely eliminated in Jersey, Channel Islands, by twice dipping the seed tubers soon after digging in one per cent formalin or in a mixture of copper sulphate and caustic soda solution (4: 125:40) which does not impair sprouting. Seed potatoes in Jersey are usually dug while the haulms are still green.
