SUPREME COURT.

The Grand Jury reported that the Hospital for the Insane was cleanly and neatly kept, inmates well clad and provided for and an air of contentment prevailing throughout. "No fire escapes have been provided for the old wing. They suggested that new furniture be placed in the old wing as in the new, that electric lights substitute kerosene and an application of paint be made. Dr. Goodwill and his staff were also highly commended. In the poor house the apartments were clean and the inmates contented. The absence of sewerage and baths was regretted and the matter recommended to the serious attention of the Government. Three persons were found insane and a great annoyance to the other inmates. The jail was satisfactory, a telephone was recommended, and also the building of a new jail with reformation and workhouse in connection which is an absolute necessity. Men and women incarcerated for simple crimes were now living a life of idleness and not improving morally, on physically. Special reference was made to a sad case of a young girl whose sole crime was that she had been found on the street and begged to be sent to jail to escape starvation.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

The Summer School of Science will open in the Prince of Wales College on the evening of Tuesday, July 12th at 8 o'clock. On this evening there will be a public meeting at which addresses will be delivered by prominent educationists.

During the forenoon of each day from 9 o'clock a. m. to 10 o'clock p. m. classes will be conducted in the following subjects:—Botany, Chemistry, Drawing, Manual Training, Geology, Kindergarten, English Literature, Physics, Physiology, Hygiene, Zoology, Invertebrate, and Vertebrate. These classes will be conducted by eminent specialists. The afternoons of each fine day the school will spend in "Field Work," when the study of the morning will be more fully illustrated by a consideration of the natural history objects in their native surroundings.

A series of popular lectures will be given in the evenings, as follows:—

- "The Creative Week" a series of the lectures by Prof. W. W. Andrews, L. L. D. of Mt. Allison University, Sackville, N. B. "Japan's position among the nations of the World" by Dr. Ian C. Hannah, President of Kings College, Windsor N. S. "The Microscopic Camera in Biology" (illustrated) by Prof. W. F. Watson, M. A. of Furman University, Greenville, South Carolina, U. S. A. "The Natural History of the Oyster" (illustrated) by Prof. R. Ramsay Wright, University of Toronto, Toronto, Ont. "Domestic Science, its place in a modern system of Education" by Miss Turner, Teacher Domestic Science, Lunenburg, N. S. "Effect of Stewards upon Fish Life" by D. A. P. Knight, Prof. of Animal Biology, Queens University Kingston, Ont. "Characteristics and Properties of Timber" (illustrated) by W. F. Vroom Esq. of New York, U. S. A.

MONCTON FIRE LOSSES.

MONCTON, N. B., June 28.—Humphrey & Kinneir's livery stable fire loss is heavier than at first reported. The firm lost \$10,000, with \$1500 insurance, and boarders lost \$2,000, with no insurance. Thirty horses were burned, of which sixteen belonged to the firm, worth \$3,000, some being valuable animals.
