The service was conducted by Rev. Frederick Williamson, who himself served in the war in the capacity of Chaplain, and therefore, had an opportunity of seeing the full significance of the awful event. The church was most beautifully decorated for the service by Corp. William Delaney and Mrs. Delaney, Miss Wilna Toombs, and Mrs. Alex. Hiltz. The holy edifice looked grand and was in harmony with the importance of the event. The order of the service was as follows, and the music was in a highly competent manner by H. F. Morrison, Organist. Opening: "Oh, God Our Help in Ages Past"; Hymn 64 "God of Our Father, Known of Old"; Hymn 544: "Fight the Good Fight"; Hymn 543: "The Son of God Goes Forth to War"; Lesson: Section 1st Samuel; Chapter: Sermon text—"God so loved the world that He gave His Only Begotten Son"; Duet—"The Lights of Home"; Misses Miriam Profit and Miss Marlon Kennedy. The sermon by Rev. Mr. Williamson comprised living truth that are applicable to any concept of morality or any faith. The holy consolation that he poured into the souls of the returned men's relatives was certainly inspiring and disposed them to realize the sacrifice which the brave boys made in the colossal struggle for democracy, is still issuing results that, in a measure, alleviate the weight of sorrow which the bereaved ones are still sustaining. We must not believe that the war was all evil; it was productive of many good deeds that, otherwise might never have been accomplished. God has mysterious methods of imparting good, but man's evil deeds seem to interrupt them. The mind that was not deeply impressed by this fine discourse must indeed be callous. Let humanity pray that the world will never again be deluged in blood.

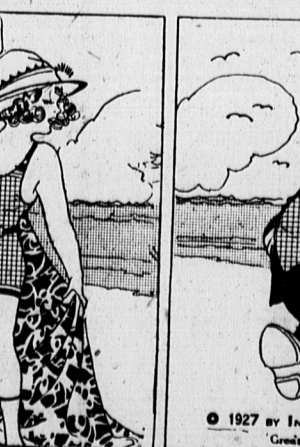
—Miss Annie Watson, teacher in Prince Street School, Charlottetown, has returned from a visit in Summerside, the guest of Miss Zelma Ramsay.

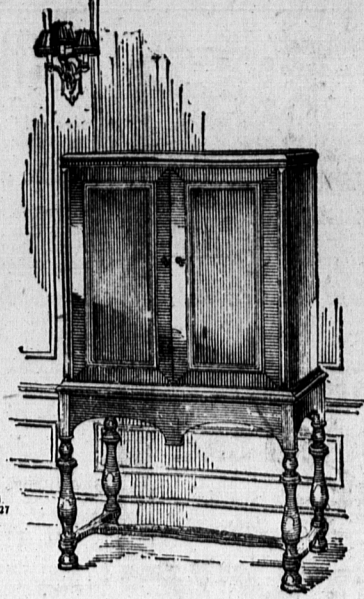

—Miss Mary Clement McDonald of Lynn, Mass arrived a few days ago to spend a couple weeks at the old home, Clear Springs.

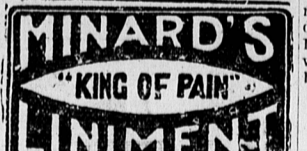
