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THE COOK'S CORNER

BUTTERSCOTCH APPLE PUDDING

(Repeated by Request).

Sauce: One and one-fourth cups brown sugar, 2 cups water, 1-4 cup butter. Place the above in a baking pan and cook for two minutes.

Batter: One cup brown sugar, 1-4 cup butter, 1-2 cup milk, 1-3 cups flour, 2 1-2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 11-2 cups peeled, sliced apples. Sift flour, salt, baking powder and sugar together after sprinkling the apples with 1-3 cup of the brown sugar. Blend in the butter and add the milk. Stir just enough to dampen all the flour thoroughly. Immerse the apples in the syrup, then spread the batter over them. Bake at 350 degrees for about one-half hour. Serve warm with cream.

BLUEBERRY MERINGUE. Three cups blueberries, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup granulated sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 eggs, 1 beaten egg shell, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar. Combine blueberries, flour, salt, granulated sugar and lemon juice. Cook in top of double boiler until thickened. Separate eggs; combine yolks with the berries and cook 3 minutes longer. Cool and pour into a baked pastry shell. Cover with a meringue made by beating the egg whites until stiff with the powdered sugar. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees. F. until the meringue is lightly browned, about 15 minutes. This makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

LEMON GINGER FLIP (Serves One) A dash of lemon juice in ginger ale makes the latter beverage drier. Here's another lemon juice and ginger ale combination that's good: 1 lemon, 1-2 orange, sugar to taste, crushed ice to fill 1-2 glass, ginger ale, a bit of shredded lemon peel. Extract fruit juices. Add sugar and dissolve. Pour over ice and fill glass with ginger ale. Top with shredded peel.

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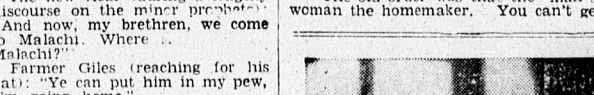
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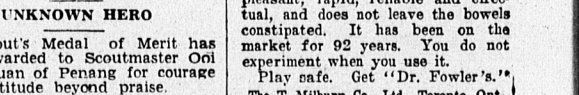
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
