Lobsters Lured To Lava Deaths

NEW YORK February 5.—Wondrous tales, rivalling those of Agri voyagers, are being told today by the crew and passengers of the Pacific Steam Navigation Company's steamship Ebro, which arrived from South American waters after having visited the island of Juan Fernandez, 300 miles off the coast of Chile and generally known as Robinson Crusoe's Island. The ship was the first large one to touch the island in 45 years.

Tales of the gigantic lobsters caused wonder. According to the sailors, an Irishman, by name of McTigue, a Sinn Feiner is head of the island government. He illustrated a trick that Robinson Crusoe never thought of, they said, by luring ferocious lobsters from the sea, luring them to chase him and then nimbly sidestepping and causing the crustaceans to slip in to hot lava and be properly cooked.

The morning dew, the sailors asserted, was as heavy as rain and the moonlight plentiful as rain. Members of the Anglo-American physiologist expedition, who have been finding out the effect of high altitudes on the heart and other organs, also returned on the steamer. They met at Lima, Peru, on December 17 and went up the Cerro de Pasco mountains 14,200 feet above sea level. Later they made tests in the Cerro Francisco mountains 17,900 feet high. The members of the party were under observation constantly and noted carefully the condition of the whites and natives living and working in the high places.

Dr. Joseph Bancroft, of Cambridge University, head of the expedition, who will lecture here, said the results of the investigations will be compiled and turned to commercial benefit. Engineers and others ordered to high altitudes will be examined especially to determine their fitness. Many concerns have been put to much expense by the recall of men who cannot live at great heights after having travelled thousands of miles to their posts. Besides the benefit to business, Dr. Bancroft said, the tests and observations had considerable value to medicine.

Veterans Discuss Amalgamation

WINNIPEG, Feb. 7.—After a discussion which lasted nearly three hours covering many phases of the proposed federation as a complete amalgamation, delegates attending the conference of veterans' organizations decided this afternoon to appoint a committee to bring in concrete proposals on both schemes, to be presented to the conference tomorrow morning.

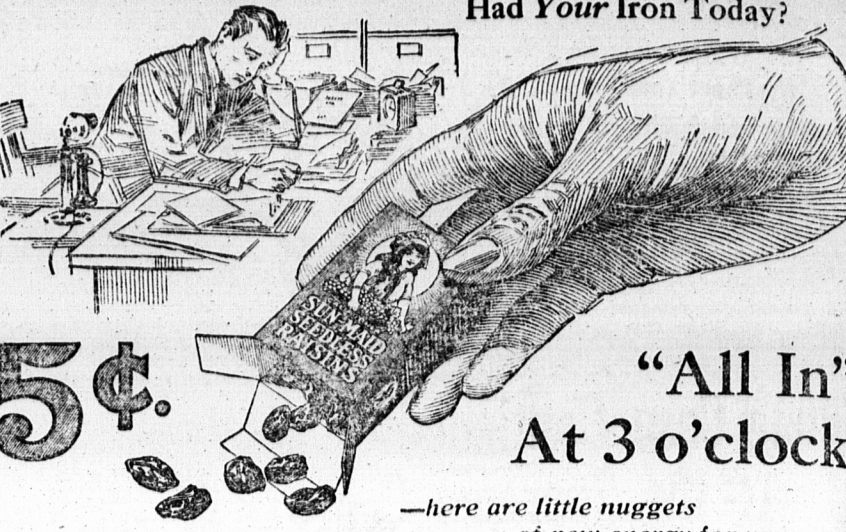
The whole point of difference this afternoon seemed to be concerning instructions given to delegates representing the various organizations prior to coming to the conference. A motion was put for a vote by C. G. McNeill, of the Great War Veterans' Association, calling for immediate action in forming a federation, having in view ultimate amalgamation and an amendment was introduced by J. H. Craig, of the Canadian Legion, asking for two committees to investigate the merits of each form of unity. Both were tabled and substituted by the motion as indicated above.

In backing up his claim that a federation with a view to ultimate amalgamation was the only feasible object at the present time, Mr. MacNeill said there were many vital points, such as political action, the bonus, re-establishment and membership, that must be cleared up. The speaker had had some experience had shown that such a momentous question could not be decided in a few hours with satisfaction for the future. To Great Britain it had been accepted only after eighteen months' negotiation.

Bad Accident At St. Stephen

Mrs. Inches was very badly burned on the arms and legs, in some places right through the bone. She was taken to the Chipman Hospital and, although suffering very much, it is hoped that she may recover. The fire was confined to Mrs. Inches room, although it burned carpets, curtains, and nearly everything in the room, including the wall paper.

Another accident took place in Calais on Saturday afternoon when a horse hauling a heavy sled took fright at the train passing under the railroad bridge and ran down Main street towards the international bridge. The drivers of three teams which saw the runaway coming towards them, tried to get out of the way, but the horse steered into them and struck first sleigh which contained two little girls by the name of McVieor. One of the little girls had her collar bone broken, but when found was sitting in the seat of the third sled behind her, and it is claimed that she was thrown that far. The second vehicle, belonging to John Clark, had the harness completely taken off to horse, while the third outfit, owned by Walter Parks, also was badly smashed. Both of the other vehicles were badly damaged.
