FOOTBALL. The League of the Cross team and the Prince of Wales boys came together for the first time this season in football at the Abegweit grounds before a fair sized crowd of spectators.

The game was a good one, and some very clever playing was put forth by both sides. The P. W. C. team was not working up to standard. G. McDonald, the centre man having to replace Smith on the half line, which threw the scrum off its balance.

In the first half, on a pass from McDonald to Ross, to Wedlock the latter made a clean run across the line for a touch, this was not converted and the half ended 3-0 in favor of the college boys.

The second half was similar to the first and was marked by good rushes for the college team by McDonald, Wedlock and Ross, and for the League by McCarry, Howatt, and Cronin.

The P. W. C. in one of their nice pieces of combination got the away for a good run across the line for the second try, which the attempt to convert failed the game ending 6-0 in favor of the P. W. C. boys.

U. N. B. Wins Western Section of League Defeating Acadia 11-0. PREDERICTON, Nov. 2.—U. N. B. won the Clark trophy and the championship of the western section of the maritime intercollegiate rugby league here this afternoon by defeating Acadia decisively 11 to 0.

The score was made up by two unconverted tries and one converted. This poor play in the attack prevented the U. N. B. team from making the score much larger, as five times they crossed the Acadia goal in such a way that the defending team was able to touch down safely.

The back division of the winning team was a profound disappointment in offensive play, although it had been travelling well in practice. Its failure to do anything in the first period left the brunt of the game to fall on the forwards, the scrum and receiving quarters, and they responded nobly. Their great strength was in the loose, and each try was scored that way.

Enquiry Started Into Swim Execution (Special to The Guardian.) WOODSTOCK, N.B., Nov. 3.—Nineteen witnesses examined under oath at the special enquiry opened here, yesterday by J. Bacon Dickson, of Fredericton, appointed to investigate the circumstances surrounding the execution of Bennie Swim here on October 6 last, testified that there was an absolute lack of order in the jail on the night preceding and on the morning of the execution of the swimmer. Only one witness of this execution, Dr. Nelson Grant, Woodstock physician, declared that Doyle the Montreal executioner was under the influence of liquor, rev. Hedley Bragdon, spiritual adviser of Swim, said Doyle impressed him as being drunk but he was not sure of this. Doyle appeared efficient he said. The Deputy Sheriff Moore said that Doyle was under the influence of liquor on the night of the execution. A coroner's juryman, said he believed Doyle had been drinking.

Not one of the witnesses testified that Doyle had shown himself incompetent enough previous to the execution to warrant Sheriff Albion R. Foster, of Carleton County, in discharging his Montreal henchman Doyle of Montreal, notified J.R. Dickson, the investigator, late this evening that he had left Montreal and would arrive here at noon tomorrow to give his evidence at the inquiry. This telegram read: "Protest enquiry, leaving to night."

CONFERRING WITH FRANCE. PARIS, Nov. 3.—The Canadian minister of finance, Hon. W. S. Fielding, began a series of conferences with M. Dior French minister of commerce and representative of the foreign office, this afternoon in the Quad d'Orsay, with a view to settling various commercial questions of mutual interest to the two countries. The conversations will probably continue for several days, and may possibly result in a formal agreement or treaty affecting the trade between Canada and France.

LEAVES THE IRISH OFFICE TO RUN LL. GEORGE'S FIGHT. DUBLIN, Nov. 3.—A. W. Cope, assistant under-secretary for Ireland, and the official mainly responsible for the Anglo-Irish treaty, has resigned his office and left the civil service, to accept the post of chief organizer of the electoral campaign of David Lloyd George.

WILHELM CHOOSES TEXT FOR MARRIAGE RITES. POTSDAM, Nov. 3.—Former Emperor William has chosen as text for his marriage rites, the thirteenth verse of the thirteenth chapter, First Corinthians, which reads: "And now abideth faith, hope, charity these three; but the greatest of these is charity."

This text will be pronounced by the Rev. Dr. Vogel, former chaplain of the Imperial Court, who has resigned his office and left the civil service, to officiate at the marriage of the Emperor Kaiser to Princess Hermine of Reuss.

WILHELM'S PRESENT SETS HIM BACK FAR. BERLIN, Nov. 2.—The former German emperor's wedding present to his bride of next Sunday will be a diadem set with 700 brilliant diamonds and a pair of earrings, the two gifts costing 800,000 marks according to the newspaper Vorwarts.
