Meeting Sammy Fuller, Boston, in a 10-round match at Ridgewood Grove Saturday night, Petrolle floored the Bostonian for nine counts in the second and seventh rounds and won a clean-cut decision.

The pair mixed it at Boston a few weeks ago with the outcome a draw decision that displeased the Fargo welterweight no little.

Fuller, although handicapped by cuts around his left eye, proved a stubborn opponent in the second meeting. He did not appear badly hurt either time he was floored, but he took the full nine seconds each time. Both judges voted the decision to Petrolle.

The winner weighed 142½ lbs., Fuller, 140.

Veteran Basque Takes Bad Beating From Champion

Crowd Of 70,000 Sees Carnera Successfully Defend Title Against Spaniard—Loser Gets Ovation For Gameness.

ROME, Oct. 22.—(A.P.)—Primo Carnera successfully defended his world's heavyweight championship today in a 15-round match with Paulino Uzcudun, brawny Spaniard who developed his muscles as a woodchopper in the Basque country.

A crowd of 70,000 including Premier Mussolini and James Roosevelt, eldest son of the United States President, saw the mammoth Italian hand Paulino an unmerciful beating, win every round and capture the decision on points by a wide margin.

Crowd Cheer Spaniard Delighted with Carnera's impressive boxing and heavy hitting through the first 13 rounds, the crowd abandoned its partisanship in the last two sessions to boo the big champion for his failure to finish the weary, beaten Basque and to cheer Paulino's gallant exhibition of courage.

That's all Paulino had. Conceding the champion tremendous physical advantages, worn by the campaigning of a decade, 34 years old and past his fistic prime, Uzcudun never had a chance against the 21-year-old Carnera.

From the first few seconds of the first round when Carnera savagely rushed the veteran to the ropes and belabored him with both hands, it was apparent that Paulino was in for a trimming.

Gamely he took it, wading courageously into his ponderous rival, so he could chug his short, thick arms into Primo's body, but it was all pretty futile. Carnera stopped Paulino's rushes with short, crisp uppercuts and his tremendous reach enabled him to keep the Basque at a safe distance most of the way.

In close, the Italian made the most of his weight and strength and only the stamina for which Uzcudun has been noted for many years enabled him to go the full distance.

After taking the first four rounds by decisive margins, Carnera out Paulino over the eye with a sharp left in the fifth, and had the Spaniard's face slashed in the next three.

Fracture Denied After the fight was over, the referee announced that Carnera had suffered a fracture of the right hand but the Italian's handlers later denied this and said Primo's hand was badly bruised but that there was no fracture.

Carnera's two sparring partners, Harold Mays of Bayona, N. J., and Arthur Huttick of New York hung up victories in the preliminaries. Mays knocked out the Argentine heavyweight, Raoul Bianchi, with two punches. Mays came out of his corner with a tremendous rush landed a heavy right and an equally heavy left and Bianchi went down and out.
