National Convention of C.W.L. in Session at Halifax, N. S.

The National Convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada was opened at Halifax on Thursday, June 14th, and will be concluded on Tuesday, June 19th. The attendance of delegates from all parts of Canada is very large and many important matters are being discussed and papers read and addresses made by leaders in their respective fields.

The session was opened on Thursday afternoon with an executive meeting, president's greeting, roll call and other details, and in the evening the formal opening took place in the Tobin Street auditorium. His Grace, Archbishop McCarthy, gave the opening address of welcome, followed by greetings to the Convention from the president of the Halifax branch, Mrs. J.C. Hagen.

The Friday session included executive reports and appointments of committees followed by the reports of the national committee and at 4:30 o'clock, a reception at the residence of Archbishop McCarthy. At eight o'clock L'Abbe Casgrain, director of Catholic Immigration work in Canada, was heard in an able address on immigration work.

Saturday was marked by a continued discussion on the national reports and at 4:30 o'clock, a reception was tendered at the Sacred Heart Academy, and in the evening Judge Wallace spoke on "Legislation Relating to Child Welfare."

Sunday at eleven o'clock, His Grace the Archbishop celebrated Solemn High Mass and the sermon was delivered by His Lordship the Bishop of Antigonish, Rt. Rev. James Morrison, D.D.

Mrs. Malcolm McCallum Grant, wife of the Lieut. Governor, will entertain the delegates at Government House this afternoon, and an invitation has been received from the members of St. Mary's Club offering to entertain the delegates at a musical evening at St. Mary's Villa. These events will take place in addition to those receptions already planned.

tion to Christianity, sent forth orders that the churches destroyed by the Pagans were to be rebuilt and hospitals in connection with them. In the 13th Century this organization was carried almost to its completion and the model of the hospital today is found in Rome under the name of the Hospital of the Holy Spirit. And so it has come down through the ages to the present time. Today there is found communities of devoted men and women working and endeavoring to erect more hospitals everywhere to care for the afflicted of humanity.

It is this spirit that has animated the various religious orders in their institution and the work that they perform. These good, religious people left their homes, their friends, and the earthly comforts with which they were surrounded in order that they might devote their whole lives and consecrate themselves to the alleviation of sickness, poverty and misery. Why? Because they see in every sick person none other than Christ Himself. Therefore we find their administration praised and admired by all mankind. Wherever they are found they always come with the gentle hands of mercy, as ministering angels of God. When our Lord was forty days in the desert it was an angel of God that came to minister unto Him, and again in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Christ underwent His agony, afterwards it was an angel of God that ministered unto Him and so it is with these religious orders. Motivated by a supernatural love for mankind, seeing in each and every afflicted one Christ Himself, they, too, become Ministering Angels of God and wherever there is the piercing cry of pain, wherever they dread moment of anguish is heard, wherever the sad agony of the dying is felt whether on the battlefield, with all its horrors, in the pest-house with its loathsome diseases, or in the mild and gentle ward of our modern hospital, there will be found these angels of God, with the gracious human touch and the divine inspiration in their hearts working for God and humanity.
