HANDS OFF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The announced intention of the federal Government to establish a Car Ferry between Prince Edward Island and the mainland appears to have aroused the interest of almost every town and village on the opposite shore of the Straits of Northumberland to become the terminal of the route. In the meantime the people of Prince Edward Island have apparently by common consent agreed to leave the matter to the Government, confident that a rational, practicable and useful route would be decided upon and the work carried forward without delay.

In the meantime we feel assured that the Government will not forget that the Car Ferry is for Prince Edward Island, that its cost will be charged up against this Province as a public work and service for the benefit of the people of the Island, and that it will be of value to our people and creditable to the Government only in proportion to its usefulness, convenience and serviceability in relieving the transportation difficulties of this Province. For that matter we believe the great majority of the people of the Province have made up their minds long ago as to the most desirable route, and subject only to insuperable engineering difficulties, which are not apparent, they count confidently upon its being adopted.

Leaving that aspect of the case as it is, the time seems opportune to state that a Car Ferry established merely to meet the wishes of the people of Picton, or of Port Mul-

grave, Antigonish, Pugwash, Buctouche, Richibucto or Chatham and which could not reasonably satisfy the people of Prince Edward Island would be an abortion. This is Prince Edward Island's affair, a matter between our people and the Government and too much outside interference must be resented. This Province has suffered long under almost intolerable disabilities in regard to transportation, and in any solution now to be found the interests of this Province must be considered first, last and all the time rather than those of intermeddling outsiders.

In this connection the Richibucto Review, as quoted in our news columns yesterday, puts forward the opinion of one Mr. Evans in favor of Richibucto as the mainland terminal for the ferry, coupled with the statement that "it was his report that to a large extent influenced the Government in deciding that the Tunnel is not practicable." Few of our people have heard of Mr. Evans, but his condemnation of the Tunnel will be but a poor recommendation for him to the people of this Province, who are still looking to the Tunnel as a final solution of our winter disabilities, if the Car Ferry should fail, and we have the assurance of the Government that our right to the Tunnel will not be prejudiced by the creation of the Ferry. It would be easy to make the Ferry a failure by establishing it on a long, circuitous route with untried terminal ports at either end. We cannot believe that the Government would make so serious a blunder as that would be.

THE MISSION TO OTTAWA.

Before the return of Premier Matheson and his associates of the Provincial Government delegation, it had transpired that the delegates had met with a sympathetic hearing before the Borden Cabinet and that the matters in question between the Province and Dominion had been referred to a committee for further consideration and adjustment. The committee is a very strong and influential one, composed of Premier Borden, Hon. Mr. White, the Finance Minister, Hon. Mr. Foster, the Minister of Trade and Commerce; Hon. Mr. Rogers, Minister of the Interior, and Hon. Mr. Perley. With the members of this committee matters were further discussed by the delegates.

Beyond this fact and the further fact that in conference with the Minister of Marine and the Minister of Justice the delegates reached an important agreement with them in regard to our oyster fisheries, not very much has been disclosed to the public since the delegates returned. And although the public are very desirous of news the measure of reticence maintained by the delegates is quite natural. In all matters affecting the financial arrangements between any one Province and the Dominion all other Provinces are more or less interested and until the federal Government is prepared to lay its proposals before Parliament, a measure of reticence must be maintained by both Governments at Ottawa and here.

Without further information, which will no doubt be forthcoming in due time, it would be impossible to discuss intelligently or to pronounce upon the results achieved. We can believe that our case has been very thoroughly and carefully prepared and presented and will hope for a favorable final outcome, as we believe the delegates have returned in good spirits and confidence. As to the matter of our inland fisheries, and especially the oyster fishery the question of overlapping jurisdiction between the Dominion and the Province in regard to public harbors stood to be considered. It is understood that an amendment to the Fisheries Act of 1906 has been agreed upon to the following effect:

That the Governor in Council may upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon authorize the Government of the Province to grant leases from time to time of such areas of the sea coast, bays, inlets, harbors, creeks, rivers, etc., in the Province as the Government of the Province may consider suitable for the cultivation and production of oys-

ers, and the lessees of such areas shall, pursuant to such agreement, be subject to the fishery regulations of Canada have the exclusive rights to the oysters produced or found on the beds within the limits of their respective leases. It is hoped that this will give to the Province very desirable advantages for the development of our oyster areas and relieve the deadlock which has so long prevented anything being done to that end.

THE CHINA FAMINE.

Very pitiful are the reports of the famine in China as sent out by the central relief committee. Here is one incident related.

"In one home in the famine district near Ningpo, China, there was a family of very poor people, a man and wife and two children. The man went away to find work, if possible, leaving the wife and two children to beg from her poor neighbors. Any food they might be able to give them. They lived in a hut quite a distance from any other house. So one missed the woman and children. Finally the man returned from his fruitless search for work to find himself the only member of the family alive. The little children lay dead on the floor from lack of food. The mother lay on a pile of straw that had served as a bed. Her mouth was filled with straw partly masticated."

In another case a few miles west of Ningpo, test works, were undertaken by the committee along the lines which the British Government had developed in other years for the relief of famine in India. The result was the application of 600 men, engaged for work at the very low rate of 120 cash per day. It was thought to employ 100 men. But they would hear to no plan that would not take them all in. They said: "Let us work together; when we eat, let us eat together; when we starve, let us starve together." The whole 600 were employed in deepening and widening an old canal which was badly in need of repair, and when complete will help to control the flood waters of that vicinity. In our own land of plenty the appeal of these starving ones in China must come home with great force to the hearts of the humane and the charitable.

CHURCH UNION AS VIEWED BY A LAYMAN.

Dear Sir—As several of the clergy of the different organizations of this city and elsewhere have of late publicly given their ideas for and against the proposed church union, let us now look at the matter as seen and viewed by the laymen, looking at the results from the practice and teaching of the various college theologians. We find a host of altars set up for worship without the name of God or Christ inscribed thereon. The great Apostle Paul, passing through the city of Athens beheld their devotions and found an altar with this inscription: "To The Unknown God." Now these heathen were not ashamed to honor the god they worshipped even though he was unknown by them. But what do we find here among a people who claim to worship the known God and His Son Jesus Christ? They have not the honesty of these heathens to inscribe the name of either of their altars. A layman coming in from the Park finds an altar with this inscription "St. Peter," a little farther "St. James," walk on and we find another "St. Paul," another "Roman Catholic," another "Zion Church." Start up Prince Street "First Methodist" or Wesley, further on "Baptist," John the Baptist, follow on the same street "Grace Methodist Church," or Wesley. Here we have found eight different altars inscribed with human, sectarian names, but not one honoring the name of the unknown God, or His Son Jesus Christ. And now what do these 149 college bred theologians propose, to build up out of all these unscriptural altars one great altar with the inscription "United Church of Canada," not bearing the name of God or Christ, what a mess of pottage this will be, surely. With your permission, Mr. Editor, I will in another article examine the creed of these theologians have given us, comparing it with the Bible, the inspired Word of God.

TO PROBE HOW UNITED STATES GOT PANAMA.

WASHINGTON, March 1—The senate today adopted a resolution calling on President Taft to submit to it, all the correspondence with Colombia dealing with the acquisition of the Panama Canal zone by the United States. The resolution was offered by Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, who urged its adoption in a speech in which he charged former President Roosevelt with participation in a conspiracy to foment the revolution by which Panama has lost to Colombia and the canal zone became the property of the United States. There was no division on the vote of adoption.
