Canadiens Win Island Bantam Title

Staging a Merriwell act in the last end of the season, the Canadiens Saturday morning won the Island title as they defeated the Rangers 3-2 in a fast, wide-open game.

Playing inside the Canadiens blue line pressing for the winning goal with the count deadlocked at 1-1, the Canadiens were forced to see this Bell dash clear of the puck to pass across to Murphy and the latter drilled it hard into the net.

Norman Larzer went to his doorstep on another play but the little goal came through a gain in a beautiful save. Johnny Miller broke away for a shot on McDougall and the clever little goalie outguessed him.

The Rangers were playing inside the Canadiens blue line again as Bell snared the puck, broke away and passed to Murphy who caged the rubber for the winning goal when one second of playing time left.

SPEED SKATING

Sir—In the "Sport Forum" column of yesterday morning's Guardian, there appears a letter signed Forum Fan. Why does not this Forum Fan come clean and sign his name to the extremely absurd statements which he makes therein?

Nothing is further from the truth when he states that ENTRY FORMS were refused to at least three boys in the 14 year old class. In connection with the rules of speed skating as laid down by the Canadian Speed Skating Union the age classes are based as follows: 14 years and under. If the contestant has attained the age since to January 1st, the contestant must enter in the next class, namely 16 years and under.

The writer of the letter in yesterday morning's Guardian speaks about SPORTSMANSHIP. Does he want to see any boy enter the 12 to 14 year old class (when he should be in the 16 year old class) and clean up on several small boys who have just as many speed skating aspirations as the other boy has? Also let the writer please answer these questions:

Where was speed skating in P. E. I. five years ago? Who revived the interest in this sport? Who was responsible in bringing two M. A. R. T. I. M. E. championships to Charlottetown? It certainly was not those who delight in knocking the efforts of someone else, for personal advantage.

Re speed skating classes. Where does FORUM FAN get the silly idea that no speed skating classes are held at the Forum? Just another brain wave. The Forum has for the past five years allotted certain hours for speed and fancy skating throughout the winter and always a few days before the Meet. All this is gratis and open to all interested in the sport. The writer of this letter, who is sportsman enough to sign his name has burned much midnight oil to build up the speed skating game in Charlottetown, and the results have proven that there is plenty of good material to develop champions, but all past efforts will certainly be in vain if any person who knows little or nothing about the game, is allowed to enter a boy under the specified age class. In closing I change FORUM FAN to and stand his statement that entry forms were ever refused one single contestant. All meets in past years were run by capable officials and this year's Meet will be no exception. Yet there is always the odd knocker.

"Intermediate skaters 16 to 18 years preceding or inclusive of January 1st. Junior skaters, 14 to 16 years, preceding or inclusive of January 1st. Juvenile skaters, 10 to 12 years, preceding or inclusive of January 1st."

Bruin-Leaf Stanley Cup Series Schedule Revised; Opening Tilt On Thursday

BOSTON, April 3—(AP)—Assured of much-needed rest, before being called upon to resume their National Hockey League playoffs for the Stanley Cup, the sleepless Boston Bruins tonight vowed vengeance on Toronto Maple Leafs, who have humiliated them in their four previous post-season competitions.

As a result of a belated concession made by Conn. Smythe, the Toronto Manager, the Bruins, still groggy from their 53rd minutes and 18 seconds of rugged action against the speedy New York Rangers, will not be called upon to open here against the Leafs until Thursday night.

Verdun Leafs In Upset Win Over Oshawa

MONTREAL, April 3—(CP)—Verdun Maple Leafs threw a bombshell into the Memorial Cup hockey situation tonight by coming from behind to score a 2-1 victory in the opener of a best-of-three game series with Oshawa Generals for the Eastern Canada junior title.

Given little chance against the Generals, who lost in the Memorial Cup final last year to St. Boniface, the Leafs surprised a crowd of 3,000 fans with a smashing offensive and defensive display that brought the winning goal by Gerry Walker in the fifth minute of the third period.

The teams play the second game of the series in Toronto Wednesday night, with the Leafs now given better than an even chance to head the Generals and play in the Cup final against either Edmonton Roamers or Brandon Elks of the west.

Les Patrick Lauds Bruins

The Leafs bottled up the famed Billy Taylor of the Generals completely. The stocky centerman, slated to appear in another ten years in a Toronto Maple Leafs professional uniform, never was through for any dangerous sorties, as the strong Verdun defence steered him off continually into corners.

Nick Knott sent the Generals ahead at 15:55 of the second period while Roland Porter of Leafs was in the penalty box. Forget atoned for his misdeed when he returned to the ice, however, firing the tying goal at 17:40. Stockey Frank Edolls, star of the Verdun defence, set the stage for the winning goal by breaking up a play as his defence took the Leafs carrying the puck up the ice into a corner. He centered out to Walker for an easy score.
