Rangers swamp Amerks 6-2

NEW YORK, Jan. 5 (AP)—Puppy Phil Watson scored three goals tonight as New York Rangers outplayed New York Americans for a 6-2 National Hockey League victory that gave Lester Patrick's speedy team a lead of three games to one in the city series for the William J. MacBeath Memorial Trophy.

A crowd of 15,205, comfortably filling Madison Square Garden, saw a speedy and well-contested first period followed by two periods in which the Rangers scored time after time on breakaway plays in which the American defence, slower afoot, was trapped out of position and goalie Earl Robertson was given no chance.

Three times the Rangers scored while themselves short-handed, twice by Watson and once by Lynn Patrick.

Neil and Mac Colville each got a goal to complete Rangers scoring, while Murray Armstrong in the first period, and Johnny Sorrell, half a minute before the end, scored for Americans.

Wings Beat Canadiens To Tie With Maple Leafs For Top Spot

DETROIT, Jan. 5 (CP)—Pushing in two goals in the first period and another in the third, Detroit Red Wings defeated Montreal Canadiens 3-0 here tonight and moved into a first-place tie with Toronto Maple Leafs in the National Hockey League standings.

It was the fifth consecutive win for the Red Wings, and gave them 29 points in the standings—the same number as the idle Leafs. Detroit's fourth win had come last night when they downed the Leafs 3-1.

Right Winger Mud Bruneteau started things off for the Detroit club when he shipped the puck past goalie Bert Gardiner for 5.43 of the first period. Gus Giesebrecht and Syd Howe, who were credited with assists, had taken 11 shots at the net but Gardiner managed to save both times. Then Bruneteau captured the second rebound and rifled it in.

Smooth passing set up the second Red Wing tally. Alex Motter, Carl Liscombe, and Joe Fisher teamed up to take the puck down the ice, and Motter drove it in at 8:07 from almost directly from in front of the net.

After that initial flurry Canadiens, who had been playing listlessly, began to look like a new club. During the second period they held the play even, but twice when Detroit were short-handed, Canadiens failed to produce a tally. Credit for that went to goalie Johnny Aowers who was outstanding in scoring his second shutout of the year.

Young Fisher, recalled only last week from Detroit's farm club at Indianapolis, fired the puck past Gardiner for the final goal of the night on a breakaway at 13:46 in the final frame. Motter and Carl Liscombe also figured on the play. A crowd of 9,672 saw the game.

Canadiens and Rangers draw

MONTREAL, Jan. 5 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens, matching speed for speed with New York Rangers, twice battled from behind for a 3-3 overtime draw with the Stanley Cup Champions in a National Hockey League fixture here Saturday night.

Largest of the season, a sell-out crowd of about 12,000 watched the flying Canadiens overcome a two-goal deficit in the second period, only to fall behind again. Rookie Jack Adams climaxed their uphill battle in the third period with a tally that kept Montreal in a fourth-place tie with Rangers.

Recovered from a lengthy bout with injuries, the Rangers looked at their best as they went ahead on first-period tallies by Dutch Hiller and Neil Colville. Gals by Joe Benoit and Polly Drouin knotted the count for Canadiens before Alex Shibicky again gave the New Yorkers the lead in the second period.

The lightning-fast pace fell off to a comparative walk after Elmer Lach and Tony Demers combined to set up Adams for the final tying counter just 25 seconds after the third session started. Referee King Clancy disallowed a New York protest that Adams shot from inside the goalie's crease.

Thomson holds Lead in L. A. Open Tourney

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5 (AP)—Jimmy Thomson moved back into the lead of the \$10,000 Los Angeles Open Golf Tournament today at the end of 54 holes, and, gaining an advantage over another contender's hard luck, goes into tomorrow's final round with a one-stroke lead over Chicago's Johnny Bulla.

Thomson, the first-round leader, toured the drizzle-soaked Riviera Country Club course in par 71 today for 211, while Bulla, who grabbed the lead at the midway point Saturday, took 75 for 212 after getting off to a bad start with a two-stroke penalty on the first hole.

Bulla played the wrong ball—owned by his partner, Harold (Jug) McSpaden—and the eventual result was enough to keep him out of the forefront of the tournament.

Two strokes back of Thomson, winner of the tournament in 1938, were Denny Shute, former P.G.A. champion, and Willie G.agin, formerly of San Francisco, now of Miami, Fla., who had a 68 for the day's low score.

Pressing close behind were Ben Hogan of White Plains, N.Y., and the big hitter from North Carolina, Clayton Heffner.

Defending and National Open champion, Lawson Little, after four-putting the 18th green, took a 71 and was tied at 215 with Craig Wood, Manassas, N.Y., who took 72 to get around.

Trailing at 217 were Horton Smith, Oak Park, Ill., Lloyd Manheim of the same place, and Sammy Sneed, while one stroke back were Ed (Porky) Oliver, Hornell, N.Y., and Fred Wood, Vancouver, B.C., pro. Sneed had a 75. Smith a 71 and Mangrum slipped back with a 78.
