FISH AND GAME PROTECTION.

An instance of what regulation and wise administration may do for the protection of the game and to make the hunting ground a source of revenue at the same time is afforded by the Province of New Brunswick. Game of all sorts was becoming exceedingly scarce and many species were in danger of total extinction when in 1896 a resolute effort was made to save what was left. Close reasons were established and in regard to some species of game several years were set down within which such game could not be lawfully killed. Under these provisions game of all kinds increased in numbers, notably the large game, moose, caribou and deer which are native to the Province.

Now the Province is reaping its reward. A few figures tell the tale. Twelve years ago all that was derived from hunting licenses was a paltry \$102. Last year the Province issued licenses to hunt big game to 354 non-resident sportsmen at \$50 each and to 4,448 residents at \$2 each. It will be seen that a broad distinction is made between the resident and non-resident in the charge for licenses, and yet as the fame of the hunting and fishing resorts have increased they have become potent factors in promoting tourist traffic, in which the indirect profits far exceed the Government receipts from licenses.

Indiscriminate slaughter is not permitted, and the number of large game animals which each sportsman may bring down is strictly limited. In the meantime the revenue from game licenses has steadily increased. In 1907 the license fees amounted to \$1602; last year the receipts from this source were \$29,166.83. Guides and woodmen tell us that under the prudent protective system the game is steadily increasing and the Province is becoming famous as a sportsman's paradise. Here in Prince Edward Island we have a large game, because we have no considerable forests, but there still exists the necessity of protecting the game birds and fishes that we have. In that regard the example of the sister Province is both instructive and inspiring.

HON. JAMES RICHARDS AND THE TUNNEL.

We do not recall having before read any explicit statement of Hon. James till we read his recent well-considered speech in the Legislature in moving the draft address in reply to the speech. In this our memory may be quite at fault. What we now wish to take note of is that Mr. Richards, who is nominated as the Liberal candidate for Prince County, is clearly on record in favor of the Tunnel. He is thus quoted.

"Another great work which will tend to increase our population and wealth is the Tunnel. The construction of a Tunnel between Prince Edward Island and the mainland, will be a great national work and one which I hope to see built. It will be of great advantage to all classes of our people and will in my opinion be the means of getting us a great deal in the way of advancement and progress, especially in regard to the advancement of the fishing and agricultural interests. It would, I believe, make this Island in reality and truth the Garden of the Gulf. We would have this advantage too, that many of those who have left this country and gone to other lands would return. These are some of the benefits which would follow from the construction of the Tunnel."

Increased trade, industry, wealth, population more prosperous farming, fishing, trading advancement, progress and prosperity such as would bring back to our shores the exiled sons and daughters, and make of this

Island a very garden of the gods—such is the picture presented to our minds. It is the general belief that such would be the results constructing this most important work. Such being the case our public men cannot too frequently or too conspicuously place themselves on record in favor of the Tunnel.

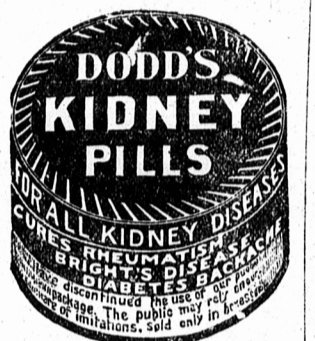

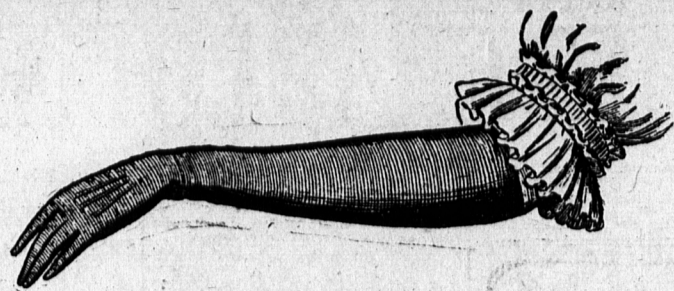
