Good News For Homes

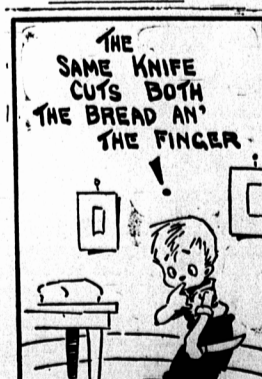
