Collections containing goods. Woods operations continue strong. Dried and pickled fish stocks are low; demand continues strong and prices are steady. Fresh fish landings during the month were higher than average. Many manufacturers are handicapped owing to shortages of materials and output is far below demand. Coal production in Cape Breton during February was slightly lower than during the corresponding month and in the corresponding period a year ago.

Warns Against Financing by Bank Overdraft

Concern over the huge deficits and bank overdraft which the Province is facing was expressed in the Legislature last week by Mr. M. McGowan, Fourth District of King's.

Speaking in the Budget debate, Mr. McGowan pointed out that overdraft interest is generally the most expensive way to borrow money. He noted that the present bank overdraft is nearly two million dollars. A farmer or merchant who ran his business in the same way as the Government would not stay in business very long.

"This excessive debt during prosperous years was really not necessary," Mr. McGowan said. "More so because there is very little money spent on the roads. The machines were broken down half the time, it was hard to get a farmer for part time employment; and

Scores Liquor Conditions

"Your new Liquor Act," Mr. McGowan charged, "has flooded the Province with liquor. It was brought in for no other reason than to increase the sale of liquor, and I think that it is serving that purpose."

"Drinking on streets, buses and trains has increased," he said, "and the authorities do not seem to pay any attention to it. These scripts are controlled pretty loosely. Every member of the family can get one and the bootlegger is doing a better business than ever he was in."

He claimed that at "at least some of the vendors" some persons get four and five scripts filled at one time.

Speaking of rural electrification, he said the only way of financing the scheme that he could see would be by building the lines, etc., on a basis that would enable the farm consumer to pay in instalments.

No Pyjamas

He referred to the difficulty of getting essential commodities, while apparently there is no control over luxury goods. "You can get pyjamas for dogs but if you want any for yourself you wouldn't be able to buy them," he said. "There are a lot of people unable to buy clothes for their children."

Dealing with unemployment, he said that there were probably 1,000 unemployed in Charlottetown, and quite a few throughout the country. This was deplorable in view of the shortage of farm labor.

He commended the courses in blacksmithing and carpentry at the technical school, also other features in the report of activities by the Department of Agriculture. The expenditure in this department, he noted was only \$47,000 which was small considering the expenditures in other departments.

Studies Carried Out On Large Numbers of Children Show That Those Fed On Pasteurized Milk Thrive As Well As Those Fed Raw Milk.

There is no evidence to support the argument that pasteurization destroys any food element of which milk has an adequate supply. Properly carried out, pasteurization does not injuriously affect the taste of milk or the separation of the cream. Studies carried out on large numbers of children have shown that those who are fed pasteurized milk thrive just as well as those to whom raw milk is given. Once again, the Health League wishes to emphasize that Canadians do not have to drink disease-carrying raw milk. All milk can be made safe through pasteurization.
