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## OUR TRADE IN ENGLAND.

Professor Robertson Home and Tells what Steamers Will do—American Cheese is Disappearing.

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—Professor Robertson returned here to-day after spending two months with Hon. Sydney Fisher in Great Britain promoting trade in Canadian fruit products. They had interviews and conferences with merchants and addressed meetings of those interested in Canadian trade or its extension. One of the main objects of their visit to Britain was to arrange with owners of steamship lines for improved accommodation for the carriage of cheese and apples, that is to have a system of mechanical refrigerators and circulation of cooled air.

He found all the steamship owners, with the exception of one, most favorably disposed to meet the views of the department in this matter. Mr. Robertson also arranged for getting valuable information from those engaged in Canadian trade which will, in course of time, be distributed to Canadian exporters.

### IT IS STILL VERY EXPENSIVE.

LONDON August 3.—In the house of commons to-day Lord Stanley, the financial secretary of the war office, replying to a question, said the cost of the war in South Africa from April 1 to July 31 was £35,750,000, partly chargeable against the deficit of last year. The actual cost of July was £1,350,000 weekly. The statement was greeted with ironical Irish cheers.

over six thousand applications were received at the head office of the I. O. F. during July. Dr. Oronhyatekha, the Supreme Chief Ranger sailed on Tuesday for Norway, in connection with some special work of the order, and to arrange for the extension of Independent Forestry in the several Scandinavian countries. Cable advices from Australia indicate that some excellent business was secured throughout the Commonwealth during the month of July. BOSTON, Mass., August 1.—One of the few battleships of the United States navy will be fitted with the largest forged anchor that has ever been built in the world. The anchor weighs 13,500 pounds and was completed at the Charlestown Navy Yard Saturday.

### CHICAGO HORSES SUFFER.

CHICAGO, August 3.—Ninety per cent, of the horses in Chicago are now suffering from influenza. The disease is proving fatal in from three to five cases out of every hundred.

### TO CURE ST. VITUS DANCE.

Dr. Robin announced that experiments had been made by Dr. Hnyghe of Lille, in curing St. Vitus' dance by enclosing limbs for days in rigid bandages.

### PACIFIC CABLE PROJECT.

OTTAWA, August 2.—The proclamation appears in the Canadian Gazette to-day bringing into effect the Pacific cable act of last session under which Canada pledges herself to pay up to 2,000,000 pounds as her share of the project.

### ONE OF THE FINEST IN SOUTH AFRICA.

OTTAWA, August 3.—Sergt. Jackson, late of the Canadian Scouts, passed through Ottawa to-day en route to Edmonton. He says the monument to 'Gai' Howard will be one of the finest in South Africa. Each of the Scouts contributed \$25 of his pay towards the cost.

### TOBACCO IN A TRUNK.

BELFAST, August 1.—Mrs. Sarah Collins, an American, who was a saloon passenger on the steamer Furnessia, was fined 27 shillings and costs today for smuggling three pounds of tobacco in a trunk.

### STRENGTHENING GARRISON.

LONDON, August 4.—A despatch to the Pall Mall Gazette from Buda Pest says: "In consequence of the agitation in Albania, Austria has ordered every garrison in Bosnia and Herzegovina to be immediately placed on a war footing. Additional regiments leave Vialuka. All the officers on furlough have been ordered to rejoin their regiments."

### DUMONT FAILS AGAIN.

PARIS, August 4.—M. Santos Dumont the Brazilian aeronaut, made another unsuccessful attempt this afternoon to win the prize of 100,000 francs, offered by M. Deutsch, one of the Aero club, for a dirigible balloon.

### TO CAPTURE THE ATLANTIC OCEAN RECORD.

LONDON, August 4.—The Tel-graph says that the Cunard Steamship Co. has decided to build a new steamer, and with her make an attempt to capture the Atlantic record. The contract has not yet been placed, but the designs have been prepared and estimates invited for a vessel capable of making 25 knots an hour. She will be built so that she can be used as an armed cruiser, and it is possible that she will have a protective deck.
