THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION, 1900.

The Provincial Exhibition Association will hold their Annual Exhibition on the 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th of September. If experience counts for anything the management ought by this time to know something about fairs. As we review the past we find that the lack in the interest in exhibition meetings has been caused by the absence of special features. The exhibition has to a large extent fallen into disrepute among city people because of the elimination of specialties. It is certain that the same opinion is more or less held by the farmers and the people who visit our shores. The Association is therefore pursuing a wise course in introducing the special features of which the patronizing public are aware. The Secretary states that the Directors made a special effort to secure such a fair as will prove a credit to the management and to the citizens of Charlottetown. It is thought that the attractions will be of such a nature as to secure a large attendance.

An efficient supervision over the Exhibition in general and over the special features on the grounds is absolutely necessary. The exclusion of fakirs and questionable drinks will gain for the management of the Exhibition the good will of the public. The presence of the "pea and shell man" is at all times indicative of a lower order of things.

Experience in other Provinces has proved that competitions of various kinds have created an interest and have caused the association of ideas which have been mutually beneficial to the competitors. In his address to the directors of the St. John Exhibition, Hon. R. B. Emerson, Vice President, states that the butter competition of last year proved a success, and the committee not only directed that it should be continued during the Exhibition now in progress, but that a cheese making contest should be associated with it. The interest taken in the competitions was evidenced by the large number of entries. The committee report that this year they are sanguine of even a larger attendance of interested witnesses.

After the experience of years the directors of the St. John Fair have introduced a new feature in the opening of the show. The audiences at afternoon openings have been found to be small. To secure a larger attendance arrangements were made for an evening opening, when all classes of citizens are free to attend. THE GUARDIAN understands that the different displays made by merchants on the floor of the exhibition building bid fair to surpass the efforts of all previous years. More entries have been received, and the races will disclose the fast time of the best horses in Maritime Canada.

For years past the military authorities of the different nations have been endeavoring to ascertain the best vehicle for the battlefield. Now the automobile is engaging the attention of the different war experts. The Austrian Army is giving the automobile a series of severe tests, in its army manoeuvres this year, to determine how far it is applicable to the battlefield. The military authorities have ordered twelve Bollee-Ditrich automobiles from the factory in Baden, which will be employed in connection with the ambulance corps. The staff officers are also going to be mounted on automobiles, motorcycles being requisitioned in their cuses. The experiments will be very exacting, since the manoeuvres will take place in the Carpathian Mountains, a territory hardly adapted to the successful employment of automobiles to any great extent.

The English admiralty have not yet concluded their experiments with the "Belleisle" The craft, which was riddled by the gun-fire of the "Majestic," is being patched up and will then be towed into Portsmouth Harbor and have her torpedoes exploded in her tubes. The Naval Department is desirous of ascertaining exactly what would be the result, if such an untoward accident, as the premature explosion of the torpedo in its tube occurred during an actual engagement.

The world has been startled from time to time with all kinds of monopolies. This time it is certainly nothing fresh. The English salt trade is excited over the report that an American syndicate covets control of the British salt market, according to a London despatch to the Herald. Brokers acting in behalf of American principals are said to be quietly at work buying shares of the salt union, a combination of producers, which enjoys a monopoly of the industry in the United Kingdom, with a view to acquiring the majority of the holdings. Word comes from Liverpool that the American syndicate has already invested \$1,250,000 in salt union shares.

Much has been said upon the commercial prosperity of the Mother Country. The indications are that her prosperity is in the ascendant. According to the Board of Trade returns, which were published a few days ago, the imports from foreign countries and British possessions during the month of July amounted to \$291,321,835, representing an increase of \$1,613,975 over the corresponding month of last year. The total value of imports for the seven months of this year ending July was \$147,495,105, or an increase of \$93,213,630 upon the same period for last year. The exports of British produce and manufactures for the same month amounted to \$122,752,785, or an increase of \$6,772,995 upon the value of the exports during the month of July, 1899, while the total value of the exports for the first seven months of this year is \$844,636,605; or an increase of \$96,047,345.

Earnings in the shipping of the nations of the world for the year 1897 is placed by Michael Mulhall, the statistician, as follows:—Great Britain, £55,830,000; Germany, £3,330,000; Austria, £1,400,000; Sweden, £2,100,000; Denmark, £1,500,000; Belgium, £700,000; United States, £3,200,000; Australia, £1,800,000; France, £1,800,000; Russia, £3,000,000; Italy, £23,000,000; Portugal, \$400,000; Norway, £5,000,000; Kingdom of Holland, £1,700,000; Greece, £1,200,000; Canada, £3,400,000. This makes a total for the world of £101,800,000, of which £33,400,000 is credited to the European countries. The earnings of British shipping interests represent more than one-half of the total.

A great deal has been said and perhaps more has been written upon political machines. The individual voter who has the purification of the ballot box at heart will welcome with a degree of pleasure the news that not many more elections will witness the paper ballot and pencil. Mr. A. Farwell, of Sault St. Marie, Algoma, had a voting machine on exhibition at the Toronto Fair this year that appears to be a marvel of simplicity and accuracy in the registration of votes. In the case of a Dominion election, where two or more candidates are in the field, there are as many projecting bars as there are candidates, with the names of the latter immediately above the projection. To vote, you simply push in the bar below the name of your favorite candidate and your vote is registered. When you have voted for one man that action locks the box so you cannot vote for him again. The voter in leaving the booth passes through a turnstile the action of which unlocks the box for the next voter. At the conclusion of the voting the box is opened and the total number of votes received for each candidate is found recorded. There is no counting of ballots, nor can there be any recount. The number is there on the indicator and nothing can add to it or take from it. There can be no spoiled ballots, and no scrutiny of the ballots afterwards.
