

The present organization of Tignish will take up the matter of federating with the Maritime group. The fishermen everywhere showed great enthusiasm and a fine concept of the principles of co-operation.

Four witnesses were examined and after hearing same and allowing Plaintiff and Defendant to plead their case judgment was given against defendant who was fined \$4.00 and costs.

PROMINENT MINISTER COMING—The Rev. William A. Nisbit, B. A., of Toronto, Minister of one of the leading churches of that city will visit the Island this summer and occupy the pulpit of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Belfast for four Sundays, beginning on June 15th. The Rev. Gentleman will be accompanied by his wife who until recently was a well known worker in connection with the Faith Mission of Scotland. During their visit they will be guests at the Manse in Belfast.

BIG PROJECT BY SHAWINGAN—Mr. J. David Stewart, son of Hon. J. D. Stewart, is on the engineering staff of the Shawingan Engineering Co. Ltd., which is engaged in important development work in Northern Quebec. Plans for a great new hydro-electric plant on the St. Maurice river have been submitted by the Shawingan Water and Power Company to the Quebec Minister of Lands and Forests for approval. These plans are for the Rapide Blanc station, first of the new developments on the upper St. Maurice to be carried out by the Shawingan company over the next few years. Work is expected to start on the Rapide Blanc site very soon. An installation of 160,000 h. p. is provided for, a very big addition of power for transmission over the Shawingan company's lines. In accordance with the announcement made at the annual meeting of shareholders of Shawingan, it is estimated that the cost of this development will be \$13,000,000. There will probably be six developments in all before the series is completed, this harnessing of the water powers of the upper St. Maurice being as provided for in an agreement which the Shawingan company entered into with the government of the province of Quebec in 1928.

MARKET REVIEW

PRODUCTION FIGURES FOR LEADING MINERALS

The report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on Canada's leading mineral products for the month of March and for the first quarter of the current year, performs a very useful service to the shareholders of a large number of Canadian companies whose securities are held by the public, in supplementing to a very considerable extent the information heretofore available on the output for the first quarter and its relation to the corresponding quarter of last year. At a time when not much in the way of increased production is looked for in any industry, it is encouraging to note that over the whole of Canada, five minerals show substantial increases over last year, namely silver, copper, lead, zinc and petroleum. At once the average shareholder will attribute the gain in copper production to International Nickel and Noranda, the total for the quarter being up over 20,000,000 pounds, from 77,445,935 to 77,357,632 pounds. A reference, however, to the first quarter's report of Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company shows that the B. C. operations were responsible for a gain of 5,308,000 lbs. "Smelters" output for the first quarter of 1930 being 3,342 tons as against 688 tons for the first quarter of 1929. For the month of March alone there was a gain in copper output of over 9,400,000 lbs., from 18,777,027 to 28,194,655 for March 1930—all Canada.

While nickel exports were down, total production almost maintained. "Smelters" was also responsible largely for the marked increases in lead and zinc during the first quarter. The total for lead was up over 18,000,000 lbs., from 69,162,617 to 82,822,822, while zinc increased over 700,000 lbs., from \$1,107,131 to 787,644 lbs.

The situation in regard to silver appears more favorable than in support figures already issued seem to indicate, for these fell far below last year's. Totals for production however, for the first quarter of 1930 were practically the same as last year's, namely 26,799,180 lbs. as compared with 26,887,413 lbs. Indeed, in the month of March this year, output of 9,838,941 lbs. was over 1,000,000 lbs., or 11% above the total of 8,785,121 for March 1929, and over 22% ahead of the output in February, 1930.

The table of production is proud using in another direction, that of gold output, which for the quarter amounted to 463,321 oz. as against 452,229 for the same period of last year, bearing out the general feeling in favor of the chief gold stocks. Output of silver was up over 25%, from 4,255,118 oz. to 5,365,655 for the quarter.

Declines in asbestos and cement in two directions substantial declines are recorded: asbestos output fell from 62,412 tons to 52,788 for the first quarter of this year, while the output of cement was reduced nearly 30%, from 1,398,204 bbls. to 1,013,880 for the 3 months ending March, 1930. 
