The cable shown above, from Major-General Victor Odium, Canadian Minister to China, tells its own story of the suffering inflicted on China by the Japanese and provides reasons for the nation-wide campaign by the Chinese War Relief Fund which is now in progress to raise \$1,000,000. The plight of Chinese, according to all authentic accounts, has shocked all those who have come in contact with them since Japan launched its unprovoked attack six years ago. People are starving, they are ravaged by disease. Thousands and thousands of children have died while an equal number have been orphaned. Hospital facilities and supplies are inadequate. There is a scarcity of food. It is to help overcome these conditions that the campaign is now being held in every Province. 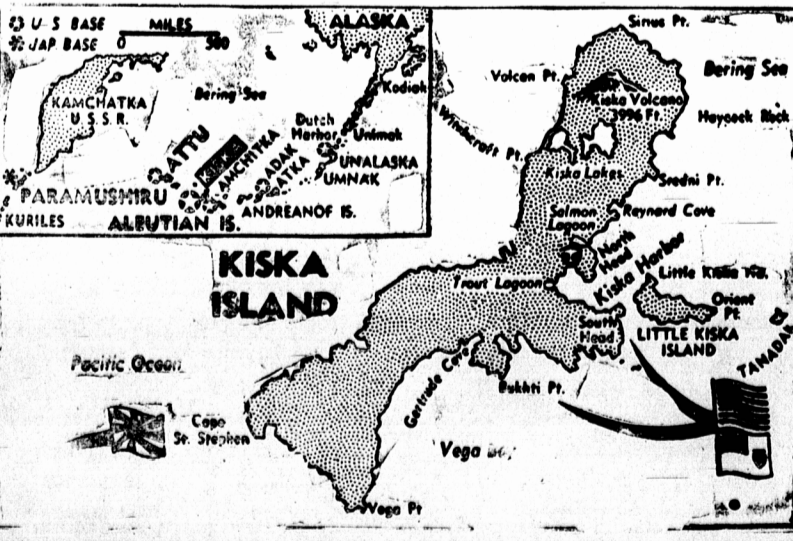
