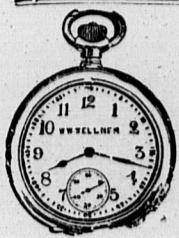

The latest news, first of all.

Miss Genevieve Williams, City, left yesterday morning for Boston, Mass.

A meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society was held in the Stipendiary's office Thursday afternoon. A code of By-laws was submitted and accepted. It was decided to wait on the Local and Civic Governments to ascertain methods of providing for youthful delinquents. Inquiries will also be made of the cost of a Probation officer, and if a suitable one can be obtained.

Mrs O. J. McKay, St. Peter's left yesterday morning on a trip to Sandon, B. C. Mrs McKay was accompanied by her brother, Mr. Wayne.

Rev. William McLeod has returned from N. B., and will conduct the Children's Day Service in Bonshaw, tomorrow at eleven a.m. A similar service in Hampton at three p.m., and the usual services in Tryon at seven.

Recent St. John papers show Mr Russel had engaged the Calvin Church and later the Trustees refused to allow the lecture "Where are the Dead" to be delivered in their church.

What might have proved a fatal accident happened at Worthy's corner about 5.30 yesterday afternoon. A horse driven by Henry Horne of Winsloe took fright on Great George Street and became unmanageable. Running south west of the fountain, the carriage struck the Mail Box and upset throwing Mr Horne on the hard pavement. He fell, striking the back of his head with terrific force, and was picked up unconscious. Dr. Yeo was immediately summoned, the ambulance was telephoned for, and Mr. Horne was removed to the P.E. Island Hospital, where Dr. Yeo assisted by Dr. Ralph found that a scalp wound required several stitches, the left ear was also badly lacerated and necessitated considerable stitching. His companion, Mr Burrows, from Winsloe, was also thrown out of the carriage but he escaped unhurt. At a late hour last evening Mr Horne was resting easily.
