D. D. McLEOD

Queens County lost one of its oldest and best known business men in the passing away on April 8th, of Mr. D.D. McLeod of Orwell Cove, in the eighty-third year of his age. He was a son of the late Donald and Jessie (McDonald) McLeod, of Orwell and was born June 9th, 1856. He was a grand-nephew of the late Rev. Donald MacDonald, for whom he was named.

Over sixty years ago Mr. McLeod established his well and favorably known general store business at Orwell Cove, and maintained an active interest in it throughout his life. Some years ago his son Ernest became a partner with him and the firm name has since been that of D. D. McLeod & Son.

Besides being an astute and successful business man, Mr. McLeod was very highly regarded by the entire community because he was a man of integrity and reliability, and withal kindly to all and generous towards people in difficulties. He also commanded the respect of business men generally throughout the part of the province in which he was known.

He took an intelligent interest in all public affairs and was associated with the Masonic Lodge and with St. Andrew's Church, Orwell. He leaves to mourn their loss, besides his large circle of friends, his sorrowing wife whose maiden name was Catharine Penelope Egan; also four sons of interest and Mr. Ernest McLeod, of Orwell, and two daughters, Mrs. Fannie Allen, Portland, Oregon, and Mrs. Charles Rankin, Mt. Allison, P.E.I.

The funeral took place on April 8th at Orwell Head Church, and was conducted by the Rev. A. S. Weir who based his address on the words of the Prophet, Micah—"What doth the Lord require of you, but to do justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God." A very large number of friends from different places attended to pay their tribute of respect to all as a good neighbour and friend as well as an esteemed and worthy citizen.

Mussolini, after a long period of inaction while Adolf Hitler pursued his territorial grabs in central Europe, moves for control of the Adriatic by bringing the already Italian-dominated Albania under complete Fascist control. It Duce can also use to advantage the crude oil that Albania has in abundance. Meanwhile, Italy strengthens its fortifications in the Dodecanese Islands, strategically located within an hour's flying distance of the Dardanelles, where Britain and France seek safe passage for their vessels in time of war. Seizure of Albania also would strengthen Mussolini's hand and possibly that of his axis-colleague Hitler in stopping Yugoslavia and Greece from joining the "stop-Hitler" bloc headed by Britain and France.
