## Horseless Freight Wagon

HORSELESS wagon to pull heavy loads. The first of the auto-trucks, which are expected to do away with the congestion of streets by heavy trucking teams, has just made its appearance in New York. The new vehicle weighs eight tons, can carry a load of ten tons, and has a speed of nine miles an hour. The platform of the truck stands four feet from the ground. The steering is done by a wheel in front of the driver's seat, while the power and speed are controlled by two levers, which are operated by the driver's feet. The motive power is furnished, not by electricity but by compressed air, the big compressed air cylinders being carried in front of the rear wheels. The driving mechanism is under the main body of truck. It is claimed that the new trucks will make a great saving in the cost of transporting heavy and cumbersome goods, while at the same time tender hearted people will be relieved of the necessity of watching tired horses straining to pull loads too heavy for them.—Chicago Tribune.
