TWO SCHOONERS WENT AGROUND.

NORTH SYDNEY, October 24—The schooner Stanley Mac, Captain White, from Charlottetown for this port, with a cargo of oats, went ashore yesterday on Black Rock, at the entrance to Big Bras d'Or. Captain White came to North Sydney for assistance and secured the tug Gladia, which pulled the vessel off at noon and brought her here. The schooner grounded on a sand bar and sustained but little damage. The schooner Minnie J. Smith, from Newfoundland, in ballast, went ashore on the North Bar while coming up the harbor last night. The tug Tona went to her assistance, but could not render any help last night. An attempt will be made to float her today.

SEVEN WERE KILLED IN RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

RICHMOND, Ind., Oct. 22—Seven persons were killed and many injured in a head-on collision between a passenger train and a North-bound freight train which stood on a siding at Collinsville, Ohio, yesterday. The passenger train was said to be running forty miles an hour when it entered the open switch and crushed into the freight.

BELIEVE ANARCHIST MEANT MURDER.

ROME, Oct. 24—It is reported that Carlo Modena, the young Spaniard who was arrested near Spezia on Sunday while on his way to Raccogli, where King Victor Emmanuel and the Czar are to meet, has been recognized as an Anarchist who recently arrived from the United States for the purpose of making an attempt on the life of either the Czar or the King. The man, who was well dressed and had plenty of money in his possession, had a revolver in his hand when arrested. The Messenger prints a remarkable story to the effect that Modena is the natural son of a deceased European monarch. Up to a short time ago he was in receipt of an annual allowance of six thousand dollars. Recently he asked to have the amount of this allowance increased and when his request was refused he started for Raccogli, presumably for the purpose of executing a suicidal or committing some act of folly.

LIMBURGER CHEESE AS A CURE FOR CANCER.

BIENVILLE, Colo., Oct. 24—Limburger cheese as the principal ingredient of a cancer cure is the announcement of Philip Schurch, Jr., a local chemist. Following the death of his mother 11 years ago from cancer, Schurch began an investigation of the cause and growth of cancers during which he asserts that he discovered that the basic germs of cancer are similar to those of leprosy and consumption. He spent several months in the leper colony of Venezuela studying the disease. Schurch's cure consists of a thorough cleansing of the affected parts with liquor of quinine and fresh sweet milk in equal parts, and then the application of poultices of pulped fresh Swiss Limburger cheese, moistened with glycerine. Although no tests of this has been made, Schurch says that he theoretically the formula should cure mild cases of leprosy.

GIRL'S DEATH DUE TO CRIMINAL OPERATION.

ST CATHERINES, Ont., Oct. 24—Inquest on the death of Susan Clark, a Canadian girl who died in the hospital here, was concluded last night. The jury found the girl came to her death from effects of a criminal operation performed by some person in Niagara Falls, N. Y., whose identity is unknown.

The jury recommended that because of the prevalence of crimes of this nature and the international aspect of this particular case, the authorities of both countries adopt, in conjunction, more stringent measures to bring guilty parties to justice.
