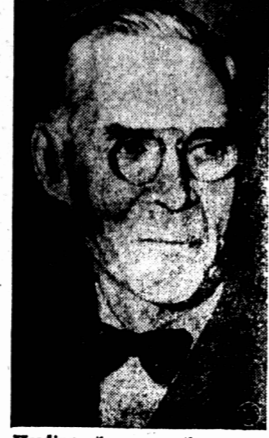

Constellations To Return To Service

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The Civil Aeronautics Administration announced tonight it has approved modifications for the Lockheed Constellation which will permit the change on a number of planes within three weeks. The C.A.A. said the principal changes to be made are: 1. Installation of improved exhaust collector rings. 2. Replacement of bulkhead electrical connectors with redesigned assembly and of aluminum conductors in generator circuits with copper cables. 3. Installation of circuit breakers to eliminate shorting, or their replacement with copper fuses. The C.A.A. suspended the flying certificates of the Constellation on July 11 after the crash of a Transcontinental and Western Airlines training plane near Reading, Pa. The Constellation, used by the airline in training flight crews, caught fire and crashed, killing five members of the crew and injuring one.

INGLEWOOD, Calif., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Historian tied Man O'War's world record for the mile and five eighths Saturday as he won the \$50,000 Sunset Handicap, closing-day feature of the Hollywood Park meeting. The big five-year-old gelding travelled the distance in 2:40.4 to win going away from Paperboy and Triplecat. Man O'War's mark of 2:40.4 was established at Belmont Park N.Y. Sept. 4, 1920, carrying 128 pounds. The victory was worth \$37,150 to his trainer.

FRUIT CHUTNEY

One gal. peaches, apples, pears or plums; 2 onions; 1 clove garlic; 1 cup seeded raisins; 5 cups vinegar; 1 cup white mustard seed; 2 tablespoons ground ginger; 1 pot red pepper; 1 cup brown sugar.
