POLICE COURT.—At the Charlottetown Police Court yesterday morning the cases of Ernest Pickard and Wm. Doyle for selling milk without having the tuberculosis test applied to cows were each dismissed. Allison Holmes and Harry Winchester for same offence was adjourned till May 13th. Wm. Mahar and Wm. McInnis for being drunk were each fined \$4 or 20 days and \$5 or 20 days respectively and Albert Heron for same offence was dismissed as it was his first appearance.

SAFE ARRIVAL.—On Saturday a fisherman named McVane, working in Hewitt's lobster factory, Gasperaux, left for the fishing ground in a gasoline boat, and a dory in tow, containing a large number of traps. As he had not returned at night-fall, his friends became uneasy and a boat set out to search for him, but without success. There was considerable uneasiness concerning him but the good news was received yesterday morning that he had landed at Annandale. The propeller of the gasoline boat had broken and the wind carried him about twenty miles from Gasperaux.
