Australian Flier May Command Chinese Air Force

LONDON, Feb. 12. (A.P.) - The Sydney, Australia, correspondent of the Daily Mail said today he learned "on the highest authority" that Wing Commander Charles Kingsford Smith, famous Australian flier, had been offered the post of Commander-in-Chief of the Chinese air force.

The aviator, who has flown both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, declined to confirm the report, but admitted that he had quoted figures to China for a prospective purchase of his Australian airways fleet of planes.

As for his own services, he said he was jobless and would consider any offer. Friends said they thought he might accept an advisory post in the Chinese air force, but that he was unlikely to engage in active service.

Invites World To Pray For Universal Peace

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 12. (A.P.) - An invitation to the world to join in prayer for the liberation of humanity will be issued by Pope Pius today when he broadcasts a message in connection with the tenth anniversary of his coronation.

He will refer to economic problems encumbering the nations and stress the need for universal peace in an address from Vatican City. He will refer in passing to the visit of Premier Mussolini yesterday.

The Pontiff will attend a special Mass in St. Peter's, where Cardinal Locatelli, the first Cardinal created by the Pope, will officiate. Following the Mass the Pontiff will give his apostolic blessing.

Yesterday afternoon Vatican prelates presented the Pope with a purse of approximately 1,000,000 lire, (\$50,000) collected through the medium of the Vatican newspaper Osservatore Romano. They asked him to distribute it to the unemployed and others suffering from the present economic situation.
