Refugees Return To Ruined Homes

GLENDORA, Miss., Jan. 11.—(A.P.)—Aided by the Red Cross saddened refugees were returning home this week-end to clean up their dwellings in the wake of this delta cotton country's greatest flood disaster.

No further rise was reported in the valley of the mad Tallahatchie River and its tributaries, a valley which only a month ago was flourishing in agriculture but now is buried in mud and water.

The Red Cross reported today that boats hastily built by plantation owners and others loaned by the valley's cities were adequate for transporting refugees, food and medical supplies.
