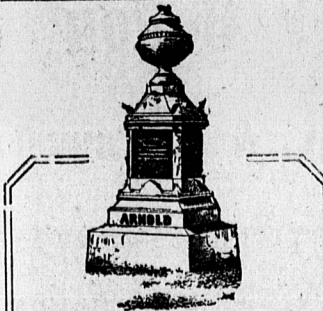

Hodgson, Charlottetown. A special  
program was printed for the occasion  
and is a most artistic sample of the  
printer's and binder's art.

A Cornwall correspondent writes  
that Misses Helen and Ethel Mayhew  
are spending their vacation with  
their mother at their home in Corn-  
wall.—Charles McArthur is spending  
his vacation at his home in Corn-  
wall.—The Cornwall cheese factory is  
being put in order for the season's  
work. Quite a good deal of repairing  
has been done which adds much to  
the appearance of the factory. This  
is one of the first, if not the first,  
and largest factories in this Province  
and is a credit to the community.—  
The flag floated gaily over the Corn-  
wall School on Friday in honor of  
Empire Day.

On a mission of much importance  
to the farmers of New Brunswick, F.  
C. Nunnick, B. S. A. agriculturist of  
the commission of conservation, and  
John Fixter, a practical farmer, are  
touring the province. Messrs. Nunnick  
and Fixter are establishing illustra-  
tion farms and agricultural im-  
provement associations, following up  
the work of the commission's com-  
mittee on lands last year in collect-  
ing information regarding the areas  
in various farm crops, the manage-  
ment of each farm in respect to crop  
rotation, seed selection, care, using  
and production of manure, the keep-  
ing down of weeds, and the fuel, power  
and water supply. The information  
thus obtained is considered to be  
fairly representative of the agricul-  
tural conditions of the country. It is  
now proposed to join the farmers in  
conducting improvement associations  
and illustration farms in about thirty-  
five localities throughout the Dom-  
inion, of which four will be in New  
Brunswick, four in Nova Scotia and  
three in Prince Edward Island. The  
farms will be owned and managed by  
the farmer who is now in possession,  
but he will have the advice and help  
of the practical agriculturist of the  
commission who will spend his time  
in visiting the different farms.

A Montreal exchange of a recent  
date notes that one big ocean liner  
now running on the St. Lawrence  
route in a badly damaged condition.  
Her owners have made application  
for dry dock accommodation at Que-  
bec, but owing to lack of proper fa-  
cilities their request has not yet  
been granted. Four other liners have  
made application for dry dock accom-  
modation for minor repairs. They  
have not secured it and are still in  
service. Commenting upon general  
docking facilities in the Dominion,  
Mr. Robb, of the Shipping Federa-  
tion, pointed out that if any passen-  
ger or "tramp" steamer using the  
St. Lawrence met with a serious ac-  
cident tomorrow there was not an  
inch of dry dock space available be-  
tween Montreal and Halifax for them.  
Furthermore, Mr. Robb showed that  
at present there were twenty-three  
big steamers going into Montreal  
which, should they meet with acci-  
dents, which were sometimes un-  
avoidable, were too large by far to  
be placed in any existing Canadian  
dry dock. "It will be August 1," Mr.  
Robb said, "before the Cruiser Niobe,  
stranded off Yarmouth, N. S., last  
year, leaves the dock at Halifax,  
while the Government dock at Lewis  
is occupied by the two Government  
steamers Earl Grey and Montserrat.  
The former vessel was badly injured  
in a recent collision with the Minto,  
while the Montserrat, an ice breaker,  
is undergoing extensive repairs after  
her long winter season's work."
