

ROYALTY IN MONCTON.

(Canadian Press.) MONCTON, July 27—This afternoon at three thirty o'clock, His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught will pay his first visit to the City of Moncton, and will be royally welcomed by the citizens. On arrival from Pt. DuChene, by special train, he will be escorted to the square where Mayor Robinson will present the address of welcome.

MCNAMARA PUNISHED

(Canadian Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, July 27—James B. McNamara is in solitary confinement. His friends say this method is being used to force him to confess further details of the conspiracy but the warden announces the punishment for bad behavior.

MILITARY SPECTACLE.

BERLIN, July 27—According to a rumor current in Society the grandest Military Spectacle organized even by the Kaiser, will be held during the visit of King George and Queen Mary of England to Berlin next spring. The spectacle will be a reproduction of the last stages of Battle of Waterloo according to German version.

RAILWAY COMMISSION.

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 27—James McCrea, President of Pennsylvania Railroad, was today called as a final witness by the board of arbitration at Manhattan Beach by counsel for 52 railroads east of Chicago which are opposing the first demands of the locomotive engineers for increase of 17 per cent in wages. Mr. McCrea made a strong plea for carefully prepared opinion by members of the board, setting forth reasons for whatever word they decided to make. He said as well as those directly interested the entire country is expecting the commission to treat very fully the situation as a whole.

DOCK STRIKE ALMOST ENDED.

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, July 27—The attempt of Joseph Havelock, with the President of the International Seaman's Union, to organize a national strike of transport workers in support of striking London dockmen has failed. The reception of Mr. Wilson at the Ports he visited in his effort to propagate a strike movement so like him that further efforts to prevail upon them men to go out will be abandoned is expected that failure of Mr. Wilson will lead to early resumption of work on the London dock.

TWO KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE.

OUR INFLUENCE.

CONFESSION OF FAITH.

(Canadian Press.) OYSTER BAY, July 27—Confession of faith of Col. Roosevelt is now ready. When he has completed its recital in Chicago, he probably will be called socialistic or anarchistic, he said last night, but he insisted that the measures he had advocated must come. "They are corrective to socialism and an antidote to anarchy," he declared. Two of more striking of the measures favored by Col. Roosevelt are fixing by law of minimum wage seamen workers and the guarantee to workmen employed in what he calls the "Continuous industries" of eight hour shifts and one day rest in every seven.

EMPEROR'S CONDITION.

WILL REDUCE THE FUNDED DEBT.

OTTAWA, July 26—The funded indebtedness of the Dominion is about to undergo a reduction. In 1907—the panic year—Mr. Fielding had to issue a short term loan for \$7,300,000 at 4 per cent. This loan comes due on October 1st next, and the revenue is so buoyant that it is likely that Mr. White will pay it off absolutely instead of floating another loan to replace it. The revenue, which has been increasing at the rate of two millions a month, promises to be fully up to the finance minister's forecast.

HOW TO KEEP COOL.

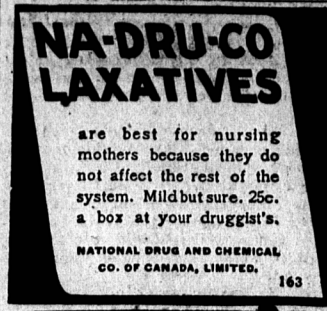
Open the house on the shady side, and close it on the sunny side. Remarkably few people observe this simple precaution. A wet towel hung in a hot room or preferable swung about for a time will cool it by the evaporation of the water. The less you drink the better you will feel. Milk, not too icy, with a tablespoonful of lime water in it to prevent it acidifying is a good beverage for hot weather and at meals. Lime water may be easily prepared by slacking quick lime in water. Put in as much lime as you like, and take the liquid from the top after the water clears.

CANADIAN MINISTERS IN FRANCE.

LONDON, July 26—The Standard's Paris correspondent, noting the arrival of Mr. Pelletier there, will preside at a luncheon given in honor of the Canadians by the Franco-American committee on Tuesday. The correspondent also sends the views published in L'Action. "England," it says, "cannot do otherwise than foster the Franco-Canadian sympathies, which is an excellent speculation for her. The more iron clad England can ask if she says that British ships will help to defend France, whilst some day the united forces will join in battle against a common foe. "When that day comes, and British Dreadnaughts presented by Canada, thunder in the North Sea, it will not only be for the honor and interest of old England, but for the glory and safety of our own country in building battleships for the United Kingdom.
