Chas. S. McDonald of Covehead was in the city yesterday and reports the roads in the country very heavy, owing to the continued drifts.

Rev. Edwin Smith, formerly of Cardigan, P. E. I., and now of Chipman, N. B., has a splendid article on the latter locality in the last issue of the Maritime Merchant.

Rev. T. F. Fullerton takes charge of both services in St. James Church tomorrow. His texts for morning and evening are: "Nations are necessary in National Life" and "John Knox" respectively.

Among the fast horses owned in Covehead are Dandy, owned by Chas. McDonald, Det., owned by George Hughes and Maud S., owned by Parmentus Hughes. It is expected during the coming summer some interesting races will take place.

W. B. Leard, Souris, who has been in this city for the past few days returned home yesterday. A misplaced line in a previous reference inadvertently made Mr. Leard the guest of G. H. and Mrs. Taylor, which was not so. Their guest was Rev. E. Bell of York.

As the storm of Thursday evening prevented the concert and basket social which was billed for Wheatley River that night from maturing, the date is set for next Monday if the Clerk of the weather proves kindly. If the night be stormy the very first fine evening will be the date. A fine program of music, song, recitations, etc., has been prepared—and it is hoped that a goodly number of folk will take advantage of the opportunity and extend generous patronage to the promoters of the entertainment.

The Guardian has received a communication from Capt. R. J. Birdwhistle, Ottawa, Dominion Secretary of the Canadian Boy Scouts, which will be of much interest among scouts here. It is as follows: The attention of the Chief Scout, and the Dominion Council has been called to an announcement by a Montreal Week publication, that arrangements were being made towards sending a party of Boy Scouts to England to witness the Coronation ceremonies. It is desired to announce that this scheme has not the approval of the Dominion Council, and all Scout Associations are warned against participating in it. The Dominion Council do not approve of the Boy Scouts being made the basis of an advertising scheme, a policy directly opposed to the principles of the movement. Further if such a party of boys is sent to England it will not be recognized by the English Boy Scouts without the approval of the Dominion Council. Arrangements are now being made by the Dominion Council towards sending a contingent of Canadian Boy Scouts representing each Province, to England in June, either to attend the Coronation (if provision can be made for them) or participate in a Rally to be held at Windsor park early in July. The discipline and care of such a party is of so much importance that the utmost caution will be exercised to ensure competent officers being in charge, and every precaution taken to safeguard the welfare of the boys.
