Contract Bridge

"FIXED!"

It is unfortunately true that even the keenest reasoning cannot always point the way to success at bridge — that sometimes a player is up against a hating guess. That was East's highly uncomfortable position in today's deal.

South dealer.
North-South vulnerable
♠ J 10 9 6
♥ J 10 7
♦ 8

The bidding:
South West North East
1♥ Pass 3♥ Pass
1♠ Pass Pass

North-South were not using any slam convention, and South therefore decided to gamble on finding the proper controls opposite him and to jump directly to the small slam.

This decision resulted in giving the enemy quite a problem! West, after much pondering, opened the spade ace — and with that lead, he forced a very difficult decision on his partner! East, having thought things over, encouraged the suit's continuation by playing the spade eight, and West obediently led the ace-spade. Declarer ruffed, drew trumps, ending in dummy, then led and ruffed a second spade. The fall of West's queen obviated the club finesse, which would have lost.

Looking at all four hands it is easy to say that East should not have signalled for a spade continuation, in as much as he had the club king, but this is a most superficial analysis. East could not possibly know whether South had started with a singleton spade and two clubs, or vice versa. Indeed, South's leap to the slam would have been slightly better with the queen-small of spades and a singleton club, instead of two low clubs and one low spade. Thus, East had to fear that any shift by West would be fatal, giving declarer the chance to win the trick and (if he had the feared singleton in clubs) to cash the club ace and finesse the club queen through East.

Thus, on a non-double-dummy basis, this was one of those cases in which the defenders could consider themselves truly "fixed" instead of responsible for their own downfall.
