SCUTTLED SHIP TO KEEP OCEAN CLEAR

LONDON, March 15—The unusual spectacle of an aged sea captain playing the part of the lawyer with considerable success is being witnessed in the Admiralty Court, where Sir Samuel Evans and Mr. Justice Hargrave Deane are hearing the appeal of Captain Paul August Braun, the master of the steamer British Standard, which sank off the coast of Brazil in May, 1910.

At the Board of Trade inquiry at Cardiff the finding practically amounted to a charge that the ship was scuttled, but that there was no evidence to show by whom. The captain's certificate was suspended for 18 months on the ground of dereliction of duty after the vessel struck, and he was ordered to pay 1,000 guineas towards the costs. His home was sold up and he was still in debt to the board of trade for the balance.

Captain Braun, who is a Helgolander by birth, but a British subject by naturalism, made a quaint figure in court. He has conducted his case with great skill. He has keenly cross-examined witnesses in quite the legal manner.

Half an hour after the usual time of rising of the court the other day, the president asked whether the case would take another day. Speaking with such emotion, Captain Braun said he regretted taking up so much precious time, but he was a man of 60 years of age, whose character had been taken away. The president said the captain had not taken a minute too long, and Mr. Justice Hargrave Deane added: "Don't let it trouble you at all, Captain Braun. We are here to do justice to you, and please address us as long as you like."

Finding his ship was doomed, Captain Braun said he was most concerned for the lives of the crew. Great skill was required to launch the boats, as the ship was rolling badly. That was where "professional proficiency reaches its greatest exertion."

"Any fool can get a boat out," he added, "and have her smashed against the ship's side, but only a wise man can get it launched safely and without damage."

"The boat was in the water, but the intention in your mind when you turned back—was it to sink or save the ship?"

Captain Braun: "To sink her. I also wanted to see her condition. When I left her I thought she was going down. I then thought from what the man said, she might become a derelict and I do not want her to become a danger to navigation."

CAPTAIN BERNIER WANTS TO ANNEX NEW LANDS.

OTTAWA, March 15—The discovery of new land in the Arctic circle has fired Captain Bernier, the Canadian explorer, with a desire to go north again. The land was found by the Peary expedition, where up to then no land was thought to be. Capt. Bernier already possesses extensive knowledge of the Arctic region and has added a number of northern islands in the name of Canada. The news that there is more land to be visited is of much interest to the restless navigator and he now wants to take the steamer Arctic north again to find what Peary found. If the government will provide the money Captain Bernier is anxious to start away this year.

DR. PELLETIER TO WED QUEBEC LADY.

QUEBEC, March 15—The engagement is announced of D. J. P. Pelletier, Commissioner for the Province of Quebec at London, to Mme. Boivin, widow of the late Jos. Boivin, formerly assistant Provincial Secretary. Mme. Boivin will soon leave for London, where the wedding will take place.

SNEDDEN GUILTY AND SENTENCED TO DEATH

LONDON, March 15—The sensational poisoning trial in the old Bailey of Mr. and Mrs. Sedden for the murder of Miss Barrow, which has aroused the greatest interest in London since Crippen stood in the same dock, ended last night by a verdict of "guilty" against the man and of "not guilty" in the case of the woman. The address of the Attorney General, Sir Rufus Isaacs, to the jury on behalf of the Crown was one of the greatest speeches ever delivered in a London Court. His detailed and masterly analysis of the evidence shook the foundation of the defence to pieces. Sedden listened to Isaacs' terrible and almost relentless indictment unmoved, but his wife was terribly affected and shed tears towards the conclusion of the speech, where Isaacs seemed to offer her a ray of hope.

Before the sentence was delivered Sedden in a few rapid words to the Judge declared that before "The Great Architect of the Universe," he was "not guilty," but the Judge in passing the sentence of death upon him said he agreed with the jury's verdict. Sedden turned and kissed his wife passionately before being removed to his cell. Sedden, an Insurance Superintendent, was charged with poisoning Miss Barrow, who lodged at their house by extracting arsenic from fly papers which he had purchased in large quantities.

ANOTHER SAD TALE OF A "MILLIONAIRE KID."

CHICAGO, March 15—John C. Jurgens of Cleveland, known as the "millionaire kid" because of his reckless expenditures, is under arrest in Hammond, Ind., on the strength of an indictment returned in Cleveland charging him with having embezzled \$49,000 from the Norcross Marble Company by means of payroll padding. He was employed by the Norcross Company as a clerk at a salary never exceeding \$60 a month yet for two years he had lived at the rate of \$25,000 a year. He threw off suspicion by saying that he received an income from a relative and he even entertained the officers of the company from whom he is said to have stolen the money.

Jurgens left Cleveland February 23, and is said to have left bills to the extent of \$19,000 unpaid. He came to Chicago and got a \$15 job. But he started spending big bills and was traced by Cleveland men.

WOMEN ALMOST BURIED ALIVE.

LONDON, March 15—Not many undertakers has had such a weird experience as did James Waddington, and American undertaker, who died on Thursday at the age of fifty-eight.

One bitterly cold night in January, 1905, Mr. Waddington, was called to the neighboring village of Hamcoat, (says the Manchester Despatch), to measure the supposed corpse of a woman, who had to all appearances passed away over twelve hours before the undertaker's arrival.

The woman was Mrs. Wolden, the wife of a laborer. Those around her believed that she had ceased to breathe, and laid out the body in an ice-cold room upstairs. There Mrs. Holden remained apparently, cold and lifeless until Mr. Waddington's appearance.

While the undertaker was measuring the body he was dumfounded to see the twitching of an eyelid. Though there was no other sign of life, he hastily carried the woman downstairs to obtain warmth. He applied restoratives, and was rewarded, after some time, by signs of returning animation. The woman, who had so nearly been buried alive, had been in a state of catalepsy. Mrs. Holden is still living.
