NATIONAL HORSE SHOW AT MADISON SQUARE GARDEN.

French Dragons, Dutch Uhlans, British Hussars, United States Cavalry officers, Canadian Colonials and Belgian Chasseurs will vie with one another for cups, gold and glory in the National Horse Show at Madison Square Garden from the 18th to the 25th of this month, according to the entry list for that event which was closed last Thursday night.

As nominations from distant points are still coming in by every mail the directors have decided to accept entries which are postmarked not later than Thursday and for this reason it will be several days before the complete list is tabulated.

Because of the disposal of some of the larger stables which have exhibited at previous horse shows and the distribution of ownership of these blue ribbon winners throughout the country there will be quite a number of new exhibitors this year who will show in strings of two and three instead of that many dozens as formerly. The entry list, however, from present indications promises to eclipse that of last year which was a record breaker at the time. Judge William H. Moore, fresh from his numerous victories at Olympia will, as usual, have the largest number of nominations and has entered twenty of his thoroughbreds in thirty-three classes.

Joseph W. Harriman's string will include Nala, the champion gig horse; Alfred G. Vanderbilt will show among others Sir James which won the gig class last year and other exhibitors will be Reginald C. Vanderbilt of Newport; Clarence H. Mackay, Roslyn L. J.; Mortimer L. Schitt, Northwood Farms, Oyster Bay, L.I.; Judge James W. Gerard, Thomas Hitchcock, Jr., and Mrs. Hitchcock, Frederick Bull and Henry W. Bull, Jr.; P. Robbins; J. Campbell Thompson; Richard Trimble, Jr.; Dominic Lamonte; E. W. Knapp; Van Duser Burton; Miss A. S. Colgate; Harris A. Childs; Miss Wilhelmina N. Rupert; Bell B. Knapp; Miss Margaret F. Tompkins; A. Charles Schwartz; Miss Dorothy B. Ives; Alden S. Blodgett; J. Edward Wykoff; William M. V. Hoffman; Charles M. Fleichman; Miss Juliette Semple; Ella F. J. Carpenter; and Allen Pinkerton.

Mrs. Robert McCreary will show her saddle horse, The Pippin which she bought of Lord Rothschild.

Among the new exhibitors at the Garden will be Edward McLean, of the Washington, D. C., editor who will show seven horses in the heavy harness and travel classes. Mr. McLean's string was very successful at the Atlantic City and Washington shows this summer.

Ambrose F. Clark, Hampstead, L.I., will show his hunters and jumpers in seven classes. Mrs. E. C. Bowen, Belmont Farms, Greenwich, Conn., will show her string in the heavy harness and pony classes.

Ambrose Prece of London, Eng., yesterday cabled the entries of James Dunn, Coombe, Surrey, England, which includes Biskra winner of the high jump at Olympia last summer; Premier, winner of the Diana cup for saddle horses at Olympia, Cousin Jack and Sky-craper, jumpers, and Sylva Gray and Dartmoor, saddle horses.

Miss Helen Prece, one of Britain's most daring cross country riders, is coming from London to ride Mr. Dunn's entries. Because of her bravery in riding the horse, Merriman, which had jumped over the rail on the previous day and killed a bystander Miss Prece was commanded to appear before Queen Mary at Islington last August and was commended by Her Majesty for bravery. Geoffrey Prece of New York, who is Miss Prece's uncle, will show five new horses of his own as well as eight blue ribbon winners from the stables of Harry L. Pierce of Loominster, Mass.

Quite a large slice of the \$40,000 prize money will be competed for in the military classes, Great Britain being represented by Colonel Paul A. Kennan, V. C., D. S. O., 21st Lancers; Lieutenant Geoffrey Brooke, 16th Lancers; Lieutenant Walter Brooke, Yorkshire Light Infantry; and Lieutenant C. F. Walwyn, Royal Horse Artillery. The Dutch officers who will compete are Baron H.F.M. van Voorst tot Voorst, First Lieutenant C. H. Labouchere and Lieutenant T. Rapman, all of the Royal Dutch Artillery, Haarlem.
