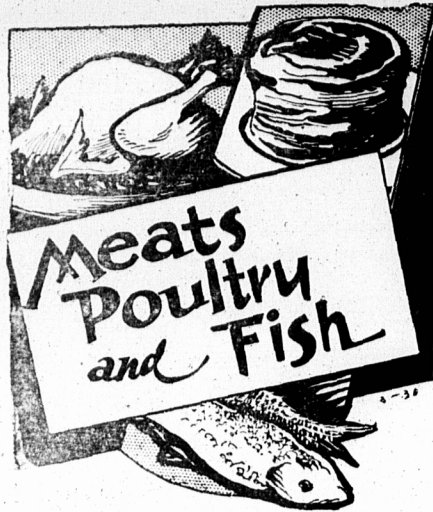


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Baie Verte

"In Retrospect"

SIR ANDREW MACPHAIL ADDRESSES MARITIME OFFICERS AT REUNION

Carrying a message from those who served King and country in great crises of the past to those of the present generation—Sir Andrew Macphail of McGill University a distinguished son of Prince Edward Island, lecturer and soldier, delivered an eloquent and scholarly address Thursday night in the Admiral Beatty Hotel Saint John, N. B. before the annual Maritime officers' reunion.

"In Retrospect," the title of Sir Andrew's address in response to the toast to the Overseas Military Forces of Canada, contained this message to the younger generation of Canadians, "let them do as well as we did, let them be ready and willing to defend themselves and the liberty for which their fathers fought. I only wish that they might comprehend fully the meaning, to us and to them, of this commemoration of the Armistice."

Speaking of the League of Nations, Sir Andrew declared that there were three kinds. The first a noble illusion, was a phantom League. The second was the League as understood by the French, an instrument for enforcing the terms of the Treaty of Versailles. The third type was that under which the larger powers, headed by France, proceeded to make independent regional pacts within the framework. "The affair of Locarno is the best known and it was entrusted to the League as if Geneva were, as Ramsay MacDonald said, founding hospital."

Sir Andrew said that this ceremony, to commemorate the Armistice, "an ominous and sinister term," merely means a standing of arms, an interlude between one war and the next. "I have not heard of any ceremonial to celebrate the peace, for there has been no peace to celebrate," he declared. "For this, we of the military need not reproach ourselves. We finished our task, and the civilian peacemakers assumed control."

He paid a warm tribute to the work of the Canadian Overseas Forces and recalled especially the excellent work rendered by the medical units.

The League

"On the day of the Armistice, 18 years ago, we hoped that, as a result of our service, the time had come when we would live in righteousness and faithfulness with everything safe within the League of Nations. That was an illusion, a noble illusion. That was the kind of League for which the churches prayed and all innocent men hoped for. That unreal League was also the kind of League to which we in Canada committed ourselves without reflection upon consequences. In this we followed the English trend of thought."

In these words Sir Andrew referred to what he called the first kind of League of Nations. Turning to the second, he stated that "with the French there was quite a different conception. To them the League was a political weapon, a defence against Germany, an instrument for enforcing the Treaty of Versailles. It was an attempt to chain Germany and a demand that Germany should assist in chaining herself."

"That League idea has collapsed. When the collapse of this punitive League became apparent the larger powers, headed by the

French, proceeded to make independent regional pacts, within the framework of the League but without its content. That League was self defeated from the first; it caused mutual distrust which is the chief enemy of peace." Quoting from L. P. Jacks, Sir Andrew declared "if you would stop war, stop trying to stop it; and stop talking about war, lest we talk ourselves into it."

Sir Andrew stated that there are those who, admitting the collapse of the actual coercive League, talk of its reform. "They might as well talk of reforming Humpty Dumpty who fell from the wall. They now demand an international super force without asking themselves who would control that force and launch it into war. There is nothing new in this proposal for a League based upon the coercion of a sovereign state. There is only one way of coercing a sovereign state, that is by defeating it on the battlefield. The other day the League of Nations discovered that profound truth, and to avoid a European war agreed to abdicate."

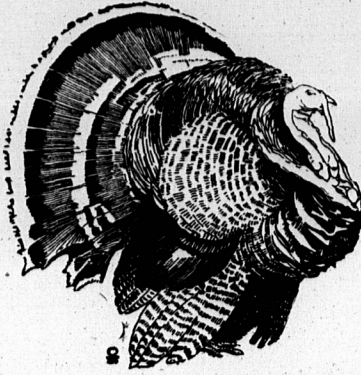
Betrayed in Peace

"In retrospect I say again that we of the military have nothing with which to reproach ourselves. The task we began at Valcartier we helped to complete beyond the Rhine. But in peace we were betrayed. Our peacemakers forgot the old imperial way and when it was over it was over; the same world as friends no longer as enemies but the Germans were allowed to detain the enemy as the result of the Treaty of Versailles."

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Sir Andrew spoke at some length of the treaty of Versailles, declaring that "that sardonic treaty was made by civilians in a world of hysteria and hate." "The time has now come," he continued "to examine the engagements we made and consider solemnly how signally we have failed. If now we are convinced that those engagements are impossible of fulfillment, and that an attempt to fulfill them would inevitably lead to war, only two courses are open to us; to extricate ourselves from the entanglements or prepare for war."

The Impossible

"Let us" declared the speaker, "consider the impossible to which we in Canada committed ourselves, and are still bound. We engaged to go to war against Japan, Italy and any one or all of 57 nations. We were deceived by the word 'sanctions' which is a war-sheep masquerading as a wolf. If Italy broke the covenant, we broke it equally by not going to the relief of Ethiopia."

"I suggest to you as a maritime people, that you cut away the top-hammer that has fallen in a tangled mass, examine the hull, set a new course, or abandon the wreck if it is no longer sea-worthy. Thereby you will save \$400,000 dollars a year and do something to avert a new war. You have the example of Belgium to guide you. When the debris is cleared away, the idealists can then begin to hope and pray anew. The only ones who will sincerely deplore the passing of the present League are the Swiss hotel keepers and the valet secretariat housed in that Palace of Peace."

"We can do something more," declared Sir Andrew, "we can deny the signs of the times. There was never a time in the history of the world when so little was known of the inner life of foreign nations. So much is written, so much printed, if we read it all we are bewildered by the contradictory opinion. Isolated facts are put forward as if they were typical. If one returns from Germany or Russia, and tells

what he saw, he is met with the retort: you saw what you wanted to see; or what they wished to show you. If he tells what is distasteful, he is branded as a propagandist." The speaker then referred to a recent trip to Germany and spoke at some length of the changing conditions in that country.
