Quarantine Stations.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—Government will place in Halifax and St. John quarantine stations three steel cylinders with vacuum pump engine and boiler for sterilization by steam. It will be ready by opening of navigation next year.

Scores the Pugilist.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Charley Mitchell, the Pugilist who assaulted an aged man to day, was sentenced to two months in prison with hard labor. The judge said that the class to which Mitchell belongs is worthless and a menace to society.

The Deadly Gas.

PROVIDENCE, Oct. 7.—Margaret Keating was found dead in her room this morning having been suffocated by escaping gas. Two other girls in the same room were unconscious and their recovery is doubtful.

Dynamiters at Work.

HOMESTEAD, Oct. 7.—This morning an attempt was made to blow up a boarding house in which about fifty non-Union workmen lived. A dynamite bomb was thrown on the first floor badly wrecking the building. No one was injured.

Presbyterian Synod.

St. John, Oct. 7.—The Synod of the Maritime Provinces Presbyterian Church in Canada met last evening.

Rev. H. B. McKay, of Wallace, retiring Moderator, conducted public worship and preached a sermon from the text, "Preach the Word." There has been only one death among over two hundred clergy during the year.

Rev. Mr. Morrison, seconded by Rev. Mr. Robbins, moved that Rev. Altho Simpson, of Park street, Halifax, be elected Moderator.

Rev. Dr. Macrae, seconded by Rev. I. G. Macneil, named Rev. Isaac Murray, D. D., of Cape Breton. Both referred to his long and noble career, and urged that, as he was now advanced in years, this honor was his due.

Rev. Dr. Murray asked to have his name withdrawn, but there was a general expression of dissent.

Rev. Mr. Simpson also rose, paid a graceful tribute to the venerable gentleman who had last spoken, and asked that his own name be withdrawn, and the nomination of Rev. Dr. Murray, be made unanimous. This was accordingly done, and amid loud applause the new moderator was escorted to the chair.

Weather Forecast for October.

Generally moderate weather will prevail, with gales may be experienced along the transatlantic route and off the American coast three or four times during the month. Although October is the last month of the West Indian hurricane season, several of the most severe hurricanes on record have occurred about this time, and no precaution should be neglected. It will be well to remember that October hurricanes recur in lower latitudes, generally speaking, than during July and August. There will be less fog than during September, and no ice will be encountered south of the latitude of Cape Race.

The Christian Science Scheme.

TORONTO, Oct. 4.—In the case of Charles Lough, Edward and John Stewart, christian scientists charged with the manslaughter of Robert J. McCausland who died under their treatment, the Judge ordered the jury to acquit the prisoners on the ground that McCausland insisted on receiving their treatment.

An Unusual Occurrence.

Halifax Herald, Saturday: An occurrence took place in the probate office in this city yesterday, which reflects credit upon the members of the family concerned, and the circumstances were quite unusual in character. The estate of the late Thomas Mason, of St. Margaret's Bay, was up for final settlement. The estate was valued at about \$800, and there were ten heirs, four of whom, beside the widow were in attendance. After the division had been announced Deputy Registrar Howe paid these present the amounts coming to them, but the generous recipient, instead of pocketing their share, went over and placed the moneys in the hands of the widow of the testator, kissing her as they did so.

To Ship Hay to England.

TALMAGE'S SERMON.

Christ All in All.

TALMAGE'S SERMON OF GRATITUDE TO CHRIST ON HIS RETURN HOME. BROOKLYN, Sept. 25.—Dr. Talmage was greeted with a most generous and effusive welcome to day by a vast congregation which assembled to hear him preach his first sermon after his return from his European preaching tour. The subject to day was, "All in All." Text, Colossians 3, 11: "Christ is all and in all."

Returned after the most eventful summer of my life, I must shortly, and as soon as I recover from the sea-voyage, give you an account of our mission of bread to famine-struck Russia, and of my preaching tour through Germany, England, Scotland, and Ireland; but my first sermon on teaching here must be of a homanna of gratitude to Christ, and from the text I have chosen I have found that the greatest name in the ocean shipping, and from Liverpool to Moscow, and from Moscow to London and Edinburgh and Belfast and Dublin, is Jesus.

Every age of the world has had its historians, its philosophers, its artists, its thinkers and its teachers. Were there histories to be written, there has always been a Moses, or a Herodotus, or a Xenophon, or a Josephus to write them. Were there poems to be constructed there has always been a Job or a Homer to construct them. Were there dramas, tragedies and powerful, to be lifted, there has always been a David or a Caesar to raise them. Every age of the world has had its triumphs of reason and morality. There has not been a single age of the world which has not had some decided system of religion. The Platonism, Orientalism, Stoicism, Brahminism and Buddhism, considering the ages in which they were established, were not lacking in ingenuity and force. Now, in this line of beneficent institutions and of noble men, there appeared a Personage more wonderful than any predecessor. He came from a family without any royal or aristocratic pretension. He became a Galilean mechanic. He had no advantage from the schools. There were people beside Him day after day who had no idea that He was going to be anything remarkable or do anything remarkable. Yet, notwithstanding all this, and without any title or scholarly profession or flaming rhetoric, He started the world with the strangest announcements, ran in collision with solemn priests and proud rulers, and with a voice that rang through temple and palace and over ship's deck and mountain top, exclaimed, "I am the light of the world!" Men were all taken aback at the idea that that hand yet had from the use of the axes, the saw, the adze, and hatchet, should wave the sceptre of authority, and that upon that brow, from which they had so often seen Him wipe the sweat of toil, there would yet come the crown of unparalleled splendor and of universal dominion. We all know how difficult it is to think that anybody who was at school with us in boyhood had got to be anything great or famous; and no wonder that those who have been boys with Christ in the streets of Nazareth and seen Him in after years in the days of His complete obscurity, should have been slow to acknowledge Christ's wonderful mission.

I was looking at some of the paintings of the artist, Mr. Kensett. I saw some paintings that were just fair outlines; in some places you would see only the branches of a tree and no trunk; and in another case the trunk and no branches. He had not finished the work. It would have taken him days and months, perhaps, to have completed it. Well, my friends, (Continued on 2nd page.)
