During his thought on part of the Old Testament lesson in the service of morning worship, the Rev. Ronald Noble took as the subject of his sermon "The Fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom" from his thoughtful book "The Return to Religion". Dr. Henry C. Link refers to a general feeling of the generation that is now middle-aged to the effect that children should not be sent to Sunday School and to such definite religious teaching "until they were old enough to know what it was all about." He is now assured that this attitude was wrong. The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. Urgently needed is the fear and reverence of God and His commandments, belief in religious teaching, a need for that fixed authority that the church can and should supply. This is a system that answers definitely the question "does it work?" God's way is written into the very tissues of our being. It leads to the noblest and the highest, it leads to man's truest and greatest goal. There is no peace, no confidence, no resources in a life absent from Christ. The fear and reverence of God, not only for the individual but for the world is the beginning of wisdom, only through this attitude there is successful international co-operation, the rest of time has shown that reverence to God and obedience to His law can we reach the highest and the best.

**OTTAWA, Oct. 18 (CP)—**Medical supplies and vitamins from the United States will be sufficient to meet the needs of 100,000 persons for six months, were carried by the Swedish ship Gripsholm which now is at the Portuguese Indian port of Mormuzo to carry home Canadian and other Allied civilians being repatriated from the Far East under an exchange arrangement with Japan.

The medical supplies, which are in addition to other relief stores, will be made available to Canadians and other Allied prisoners and interned in Japanese hands, the external affairs department said in making the announcement.

Department said the Gripsholm, which left New York Sept. 15, to meet Canadian and other Allied civilians being repatriated, had arrived at Mormuzo.
