**THE MARKETS**

(Canadian Press)

**OTTAWA, Nov. 24.**—The market is generally unchanged today with the tone of both fresh and storage eggs strong. Toronto country shippers are paying extras 52. Firsts 46, making sales extras 60, firsts 52, f.o.b. Montreal, jobbing fresh extras 68, firsts 65, storage extra 46, firsts 41, seconds 36. A car of fall fresh extras reported at 49. Delivered, a car of storage seconds 32, a car of storage extras was offered at 42, but not sold.

Winnipeg dealers are quoting country shippers extras 65. Firsts 50, to 55, seconds 32 to 33. Jobbing fresh extras 70, firsts 66, seconds 35. Storage extras 46/ firsts 42, seconds 34. Poultry show increase.

Edmonton jobbing storage extras 45, firsts 40, seconds 35. Poultry market firm. Dealers quoting country shippers live chickens 12 to 14, fowl 10 to 12, turkeys 17 to 13.

Calgary egg market remains steady. Poultry is moving freely, chickens 11 to 14, heavy fowl 12, Light fowl 9, turkeys 19.

Vancouver jobbing fresh extras 64, firsts 61, seconds and pullets 42. Light hens 18, heavy 24, light spring 25, heavy 28. Saint John jobbing fresh extras 65, firsts 58, seconds 50, storage extras 45, firsts 43, seconds 40. Poultry supply is light.

Charlottetown the demand is good and market higher under light receipts, wholesalers paying country points extras 53, firsts 45, seconds 43.

Montreal, Nov. 24.—The export trade in the local grain market was very active today there being an exceptionally good demand from foreign importers. It is estimated that fully 5,000,000 bushels of wheat were sold. There was also a good demand from foreign buyers for coarse grains. The domestic trade in cash grain was likewise brisk. The feature of the flour valuation was the much stronger feeling that developed in the market for spring wheat grades and millers generally advanced prices another 30 cents per barrel which makes a net rise of 50 cents per barrel during the past week. The price of winter wheat flour was also so advanced 30 cents per barrel. A stronger feeling prevailed in the millfed market and prices remained at the same level. There was no change in the condition of the market for baled hay prices being maintained. The egg market was active with a firm undertone. The latter market while firm, was not very active. No improvement was noted in the cheese market business all directions being reported quiet.

**Stock Market**

**MONTREAL, Nov. 24.**—Live stock for sale on the two markets this morning amounted to 227 calves, 65 lambs, 818 hogs, and 36 steers. The cattle were made up of three loads of good Northwest steers which were being held for export and the balance were common cows, canners and bulls. The common cows sold around three dollars; canners two and twenty-five and canners two dollars and three fifty.

There were no good calves and mixed lots of just fair quality sold from nine to ten dollars. Grassers sold for four twenty-five and four fifty. Best lambs offered brought twelve twenty-five and common ones eleven fifty. A few were sold yesterday for twelve fifty. Trading in hogs was somewhat slow and the few sales made today were at yesterday's level of thirteen dollars for mixed lots and thirteen fifty for select. Some poorer quality hogs and for two or three seventy-five and some ten dollars and ten twenty-five.
