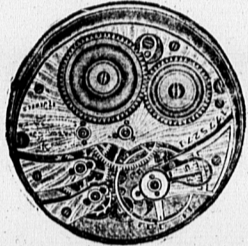

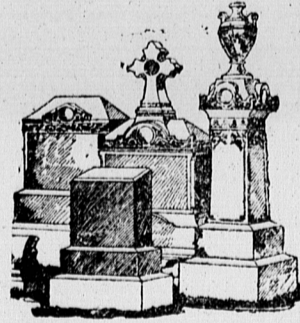

#### THE PROPOSED ANNEXATION OF MAINE.

We are gratified to find the admirable spirit and temper in which a number of leading American papers have received The Guardian's recent article on this interesting topic. So far as our reading goes they have treated the matter with a gravity befitting its importance. The Springfield Republican says: "There is no sort of question, as the Charlottetown (P.E.I.) Guardian says, that Maine belongs geographically to Canada, and as a foreign state is 'an obstacle to the right development of our (Canada's) great transportation systems.' Canadians are also privileged to think of annexing Maine some time, with the consent of that state and of the United States. But this is all that can be conceded. The Ashburton treaty is irrevocable. It used to be charged, at that negotiation in settlement of the northeastern boundary dispute, that Secretary Daniel Webster for the United States was overreached, but this complaint of the situation, coming from the other side of the line nearly 70 years after the event, would seem to indicate that the British were as near to the right in calling the treaty the 'Ashburton capitulation.' There are those in this country who have thought that more of the old State of Maine would have gone to Canada but for Mr. Webster's great qualities as an entertainer. It should now make

very little practical difference to Canada or Maine whether the boundary runs where it is or where this Prince Edward Island journal would have it run—provided the tariff barrier between the two countries is broken down."

The New York Sun quotes from The Guardian's article and returns thanks for "the considerate admission" that any movement towards the union of Maine with Canada must come from the people of the Pine Tree State and with Uncle Sam's consent.

A valued correspondent writing privately to the editor from New York tells that he has been much interested in what the New York papers have had to say respecting The Guardian's article, which he intimates has created something of a "sensation" across the border. He goes on to point out that our contention is borne out by Prof. Hines, who wrote on the identification of the British people with the ten lost tribes of Israel, and "proved by texts from the Bible that a portion of the eastern part of the United States will in the future be attached to Canada and that the Anglo-Saxon race will yet rule the world with Britain and the United States standing together against all-comers."

Thus fortified by prophecy, the new movement to round out the Dominion should hereafter make a strong and rapid progress.

#### THE MEETING OF PARLIAMENT.

The eleventh Parliament of United Canada will open its third session at Ottawa today. Earl Gray, although he had formally taken leave last spring, will by virtue of his extended term of office, no doubt officiate at both the opening today and the prorogation next spring. time both parties will doubtless desire the prorogation in view of the then close approach of the King's coronation and the very important meeting of the Colonial Conference in London.

#### TO PROHIBIT CANVASSING.

We think the reforms to which the City Council stands now committed are in the main good. The most of them have been tested and approved in other cities long ago. Still, even at this late date it is well that the Council stands formally pledged to the adoption of the ballot, and the better enforcement of existing laws dealing with the cigarette evil and school-boy truancy, and to a new measure dealing with bribery in civic elections.

The one real new departure from established precedents is the proposed enactment against canvassing in civic elections. This seems in a general way desirable to many persons, but is an experiment which it will be rather difficult to carry out. It is proposed to prohibit "canvassing or soliciting votes at civic elections other than at public meetings, or through the press." This obviously means that a candidate shall not personally persuade or ask electors to vote for him except at public meetings. It is not quite so clear that it means to prohibit others than the candidates from so soliciting voters, but we presume this is also intended.

But there are as many ways and wiles in canvassing the electors as there are in courting a woman. In dress, bearing and manner, in the sweet smile he wears, in the heartiness of his greeting, in the cordiality of his handshaking with the hundreds whom he passed with a silent nod, the candidate is canvassing. In his ready compliments, his kind inquiry for the health and welfare of the elector's wife and children, in his conspicuous attendance at church and society meetings he is canvassing. In all these and a score of other ways, though he may not orally ask any man for his vote the candidate is canvassing, and who shall hinder him?
