Spread each biscuit with butter and brown sugar and put in oven until crisp and warmed through. Serve with either hot or cold milk or cream.

Easter breakfast is a truly festive occasion with:

Fresh strawberries with cream; corn flake omelet with tiny sausages; hot muffins, jam, decaffeinated coffee.

An omelet is one of those things that needs to be handled with care. Lack of care can often do more damage than want of knowledge.

CORN FLAKE OMELET

Beat four eggs, whites and yolks separately. To the yolks add one-half teaspoonful salt, a dash of pepper and three tablespoonfuls water. Fold yolks into whites and carefully add four cups corn flakes. Pour into a greased omelet or frying pan and cook until a golden brown. Serve immediately.

You may like a spoonful of tart jelly with the omelet instead of jam for the muffins in the above menu.

BUSINESS DEALT WITH AT CONVENTION

Teachers Ratify Pensions Plan at Concluding Federation Session — Mr. Norman MacDonald New President

The receiving of reports from committees, the discussion and adoption of resolutions, and the election of officers for the coming year occupied the time of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation Thursday morning at the final session of the convention. Among the resolutions passed was one ratifying the amended pensions plan. Another resolution approved the resolution passed last year expressing the opinion of the Federation that one year's normal training should be required of all students before a teacher's license be granted.

The nominating committee brought in the following slate of officers, the appointment of all of whom was approved:

President, Norman MacDonald, Kensington.

Vice President, Alice Lavie, Souris Recording Secretary, Fred Skerrey, Alberton.

Financial, Miss Walsh, City.

C. T. F. delegate appointment left to executive.

The retiring president, Mr. Elmer Pineau presided at the session.

Examination Papers

The matter of entrance examination was the first subject discussed. At the local convention it had been decided that the papers for the last ten years should be printed for the benefit of the teachers, the president reported.

Mr. Russell Leard moved that the examinations be printed. The motion was seconded by Mr. J. W. F. MacCallum. It was moved by way of amendment by Mr. H. W. Yeo and seconded by Mr. L. T. Lowther that the copies of examinations be sent free to the teachers who made application. The amendment carried.

Education Tour

Mr. Bertram Larkin for a committee appointed to look into the matter of an education tour of Montreal, Ottawa and Quebec presented his report. A number of plans suggested by the railway were set forth.

After considerable discussion it was decided that the carrying out of the arrangements of the tour be left to the committee.

Pensions

Mr. L. F. MacDonald presented the report for the pensions committee. He stated that some weeks ago a number of teachers had been called into conference by the Government on the matter of pensions. Times were hard and the Government did not feel able to meet the teachers' payments dollar for dollar. Members of the Government were opposed to any extravagance in connection with the pensions.

Mr. MacDonald explained the amendments to the act. A teacher might go out after thirty years' service, provided they had reached the age of sixty. The Government would contribute \$4,000 a year. The Governor in Council would put the Act in force immediately on approval of the teachers. Provision had been made for refund to teachers who left the profession before such time as they were eligible. The Government was interested in seeing the pensions plan carried out successfully.

Mr. MacDonald moved that the amended act be ratified by the Federation. The motion carried.

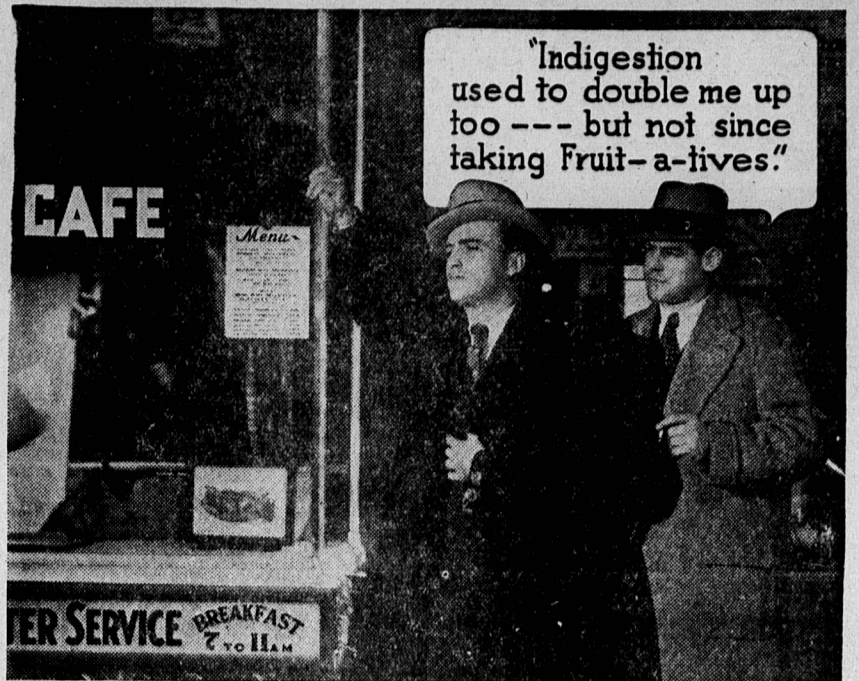
Mr. Russell Leard presented the report of the Secretary Treasurer. A favourable balance of more than \$1,000 remained to the credit of the Federation.

The adoption of the report was moved by Mr. Leard and seconded by Mr. Alfred Doucette.

(2) That the executive take such action as will give the public a half hour radio lecture on education at least once a week.

(3) That the teachers continue to lend their assistance to the provincial Fire Marshal towards the prevention of fire by the distribution of literature and other ways, not only during Fire Control week but throughout the whole year.

(4) Whereas many full qualified teachers are without a position and applications for permits and renewals of license still continue to pour into the education office, be it therefore resolved that the convention go on record as being strongly opposed to the continuance of the practice of granting such permits.

(5) That the member of the Federation on the Board of Education use his influence to have a fair share of the books of the new Carnegie Corporation library pertain to school work and as aids to teachers.

(6) That the convention reaffirm the resolutions passed last convention relative to normal school work and teacher training and that the executive take action as will ensure that these resolutions reach the proper authorities.

(7) That the teacher training course in Prince of Wales College be separated from the regular academic course.

(8) That the Department make arrangements to have teachers avail themselves of the opportunity to take the extension course in teacher training.

(9) That the Prince of Wales College course be extended to a fourth year so as to raise it to the status of a junior college.

Mr. L. T. Lowther presented the report of the nominating committee.

Mr. Norman MacDonald, the newly appointed president was then escorted to the chair.

THE VIRGIN'S BOWER The Virgin's Bower is a common native climber in Eastern Canada, and is not used as much as it should be for beautifying the home. Next to the Virginia Creeper it is, perhaps, the most satisfactory native climber to plant. It is a very rapid grower and soon covers anything it is planted near, says the Dominion Department of

Agriculture, reaching a height of 20 feet or more. It clings by tendrils and should have something to which these can fasten. As the soil around buildings is poor as a rule, it is best to replace it with some well-manured soil of good loamy character.
