

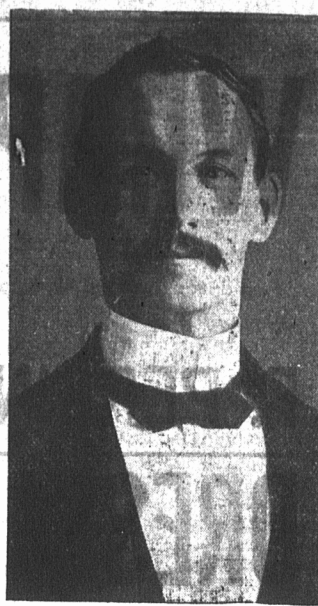
BANK CASHIER ARRESTED.

CHICAGO, June 30.—C. J. Jacob H. Fliao, cashier of the German American National Bank of Aurora, Ill., has been arrested, charged with the misappropriation of \$50,000 of the funds of the bank. The prosecution has extended over a period of three years. He was held in \$10,000 bonds for the July term of the federal grand jury.

PRESBYTERY MET AT BLOOMFIELD

On Thursday, June 30th, and was Constituted

William McDonald Ordained and Inducted into the Charge of Bloomfield, O'Leary and Brae Congregation.

At Bloomfield, and within the Presbyterian Church there on Thursday June 30th, 1904, and at 2.30 p. m., at which time and place the Presbytery of P. E. I. met and was constituted, R. Davidson, Moderator, Protom, with whom were associate W. A. Mason and D. McLean, Ministers and D. Reilly and A. S. Gordon, elders. D. McLean was appointed Clerk, Protom.

The edict having been returned duly served, the Moderator made the usual proclamation, and there being no objections to the life or doctrine of William McDonald, the Presbytery proceeded to ordain and induct him. Rev. W. A. Mason conducted divine service, preaching an appropriate sermon from Acts 21. "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place."

The Moderator then narrated the steps and put the usual questions, to which satisfactory answers were given, after which, by prayer and the laying on of the hands of the Presbytery, William McDonald was set apart to the office of the holy ministry. The Moderator then gave him the right hand of fellowship and inducted him into the pastoral charge of Bloomfield, O'Leary and Brae congregation. The other members of Presbytery also gave the right hand of fellowship. The Moderator then addressed the newly inducted minister, and D. MacLean the people.

Mr. MacDonald having signified his willingness to subscribe the formula, it was agreed to add his name to the roll of Presbytery, after which he was introduced to the people as they were retiring. The Presbytery then conferred with the elders and managers on the affairs of the congregation.

On motion of Mr. Mason the Presbytery adjourned to meet in Zion Church, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, July 5, at 1 p. m., of which public intimation was made, and this adjourned closed with the benediction.
