SUNDAY SCHOOL FARM.—Mrs. J. A. Clark of the Experimental Station has set her Sunday School class to work on a gardening project on a piece of land off Oyster Street. Operations were commenced on this garden yesterday when quantities of sweet corn and garden peas were planted. This class purposes taking up the production of turnip seed.

VICTORIA PARK SCHOOL FARM.—The first onslaught on the school farm at Victoria Park was made yesterday by the boys of West Kent and Queen Square schools and the girls of Prince Street School. There were about 70 boys and 20 girls in the attack on the new grounds and very satisfactory progress was made. Quite an area of potatoes and beans were planted. The area, about an acre, is divided into plots of about one hundredth of an acre, each plot being in charge of two, and in some cases three pupils. In addition to potatoes and beans some plots of sweet corn will be planted.
