## SPLENDID RACING YESTERDAY AT THE EXHIBITION TRACK

The third of the four days Exhibition horse races was staged yesterday before about 1,500 spectators. The races deserved a bumper crowd. No doubt the fine weather has been utilized by parties in the country to harvest their crop but they missed some wonderful contests. The weather was fine and warm and everybody was quite comfortable, which was a change from the weather of the previous two days.

There were three harness races run off and a running race, which was placed on the card for extra measure. This new feature of the programme was greatly enjoyed. The spirited steeds and their riders, some of them in gay colors, added a touch of the picturesque. The gallopers got away with very little trouble and scampered round the track as runners do. No doubt this will prove the fore-runner of running contests every year in connection with the Exhibition races as it was undoubtedly a success, and popular with everyone.

The Halfway entry captured the bacon in this event. He was certainly the best horse, being a thoroughbred and accustomed to running, and was well ridden by an ex-cavalryman who had a large experience with runners down South.

**3 MINUTE TROT**

The first race called was the Three Minute Trot in which there were no less than twelve starters, a rather unwieldy field and one in which horses who could not get away fast were greatly handicapped.

1st Heat: There were several scores before a satisfactory start was secured and then the race settled down to a contest between Silver Todd, Stella Todd and Incomparable. Silver Todd made a break near the three-quarter pole and led his chance but Stella Todd kept going strong, finishing a length and a half to the good, incomparable second. Silver Todd third and Dick Bingen fourth.

2nd Heat: At the word "go" incomparable shot to the front and was never headed, though both Stella Todd and Silver Todd took turns trying to get to the little black horse. Stella Todd made a break on the home stretch and lost badly. Silver Todd and Dick Bingen beat her out for places. They finished second and third respectively, Marjorie fifth, and Whitwah sixth.

3rd Heat: This was mainly a battle between Incomparable and Silver Todd, with Incomparable considerably the best of it. Silver Todd finished two lengths back. Stella Todd third, closely pressed by Marjorie, who went a special-ty good heat.

4th Heat: Only horses standing in the money went out for the fourth heat. This left Incomparable, Silver Todd, Stella Todd and Dick Bingen in the race. It was incomparable's though he had to work for it all the way. Silver Todd keeping right after him, forcing him to a mile-drive on the stretch Stella Todd was again third, Dick Bingen fourth.

Incomparable is for the first time in his career sporting a win race, and Mr. Peter Conroy, his driver, and Mr. Geo. Farrah, are to be congratulated on getting him "sound." He is a sterling good trotter and if he keeps right will be a factor in much faster company than yesterday. We congratulate Mr. Farrah, who is a native of the Magdalen Islands, and genuinely good sportsman, on his success.

**RUNNING RACE**

The next race called was the running race, 1/2 mile heats, best two out of three.

1st Heat: The horses lined up for a standing start at the judges' stand and after a couple of false starts they were sent away. The Halifax horse, Dan Hawthorn, ridden by Collins, a local young man and ex-cavalryman, flashed right out in front and was never headed though closely pressed by Silence, a local entry. Dan Hawthorn finished about two lengths to the good. There was a great race between Spark Plug and Bingen Boy for third place, Spark Plug winning the place by half a length, Major K. fifth. Time, 55 1/2.

2nd Heat: They got away with out any difficulty to a good start, Dan Hawthorn taking the lead as before. This time he was closely pressed by Spark Plug, who finished on his rump, Silence being a close third, Major K. fourth, Bingen Boy dropping back to fifth position. Time, 55 1/2.

Dan Hawthorn and Silence are running bred horses. Spark Plug was out on the Western plains and was brought here in a shipment of horses this spring. Bingen Boy is Island bred, raised by Byrne Bros. Major K. is also of trotting breed.

**2.14 Trot and Pace**

Seven good horses faced the starter, horses that have been lining up regularly on the Maine and New Brunswick circuits as well as Island horses who have not gone far afield. High Knob Beauty met her first defeat of the season yesterday when Dan Patchen took her and the others into camp, stepping five wonderful heats and showing that he is a real, dead game racehorse. It was no ordinary field that he defeated yesterday and his win is therefore a highly creditable one.
