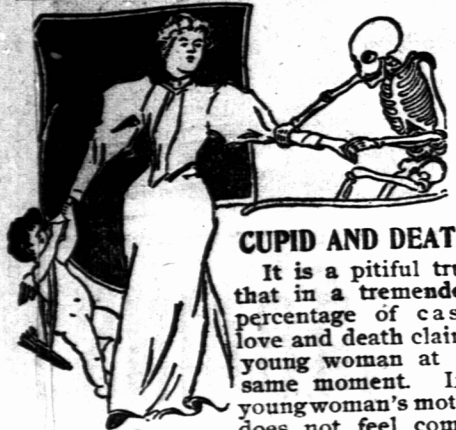
Remarkable Peace for a Gospel Text.

and anything on the continent that is the limit. And yet it is sad to reflect what a sarcasm that fact is upon American civilization. Americans mistake vastness for richness, wealth for worth, glitter for intrinsic value, elephantine proportions for brawn and brain, and do not yet know, this really half-civilized people, that true worth and strength lie in medium, quiet, pretenceless things, and that of such is the Kingdom of Heaven. Which is all merely prefatory.

As I observed, New York always goes the whole length. Here is a gospel revival started recently in the very heart of the great city that promises to outclass any former movement of the kind.

It began last Monday in a big tent which holds 2000 persons, erected on the triangle at Fifty-sixth Street and Broadway. Remarkable place for a gospel tent. Around and about it is the tumultuous roar of the city's life, the rumbling and crash of elevated trains, the clanging and battering of cable and trolley cars, the sharp staccato of trunks on the cables and all the thousand and one discordant noises of which this B.rough makes a specialty from 5 a. m. to 10 p. m. Most people would consider it a very unpropitious spot for religious work, but the tent is certainly well located to attract passers-by and the results so far have been good. Hundreds have already signified a change of heart in the way usual at revival services, and vast gatherings have pressed into the tent at each meeting. Services occur every week night save on Saturday, and at 4.30 Sunday afternoons. The object of the promoters is to fill the gap caused by the closing of so many of the churches in the hot months, and to re-affirm the efficacy and authority and authenticity of the Bible, which of late has been attacked so fiercely. The meetings are mainly a protest against the Higher Criticism so-called, which is rampant in New York at the present time, and threatens to weaken the faith of many. And the great fervor and enthusiasm of the revival is bearing testimony that New York has yet a place in its heart for the good old homely truths of the Bible, on which this nation indeed was built; those old homely truths which it is thought "fashionable" now to sneer at, but which contain the only inspiration that makes life worth enduring, and make the inevitable hot not only bearable but sublime.

Mr. Moody is promised for the services in July and his presence will be a memorable event.

THE WEATHER AND ITS VAGARIES.

The city has enjoyed a week and a half of the most delightful weather, cool, breezy, clear, with nights marked by a more soporific temperature than is expected at this season. But New York is a place of atmospheric surprises, where the mercury delights to do stunts from grave to gay and from lively to severe; and while to day may be cool, to-morrow may be tropical, such as would make the heathen rage and citizens imagine unpublishable things. There is no escaping of the heat to come, in the corporeal life on Manhattan Island, such as there is the Scriptural heat to come, which is obviated by prayer and fasting. In the former case applications of fizz early and often, and diaphanous wear, likewise an occasional diaphanous (e)-wear, are the only agencies at present popular on Broadway. There may be others, but not just here. Of course the orchestra has not started to play yet so far as the real, trade-marked Manhattan Island hot wave is concerned, for it is posted for July and August, and is always the limit, so of course the house will be dark until the July curtain rolls up. However, there's always Coney Island, and the roof-gardens, with the roof-gardens a poor second. So far as popularity in hot weather is concerned, all other resorts and devices whatsoever are simply left at the post when com-

pared with Coney, which in spite of devastation by fire and irritating Raines law enactments, is doing a land-office business from early morn till Dewey eve, seven days each week, with a "crush" on Sunday to attempt to describe which would instantly dry up the fluid in any fountain pen. But signs multiply that Coney has seen its naughtiest days; and there is reason to guess that the notorious section of the town will disappear under the lava of civic reform in a truly Pompeian manner. And at an early date. They may not convert the "Bowery" over there into a park this year, but there will be a park next year, and the place that knew the music halls and the "barkers" and the photo-galleries and the astrologists and the peanut-stands will not know them at all any more for ever. For the Bowery will be a dream. It is only natural and just that evil should give away to good, and that Coney Island should be shrived of all its fakirs and filth, and made into a beautiful park for New York's panting millions, even though these same panting millions, with the contrary of human nature, enjoy being real devilish on the "Bowery" much more than being real cool in a Park! Such is life. At any rate those who wish to have a vision of Coney Island while it is the whole thing should apply there as soon as possible, as it may become good any time now. M. A. N. H.
