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### Doctor Questions 'Future of Nurses

MONTREAL, May 22.—(CP)—A letter from a Western physician protesting against graduation exercises for nurses was the subject of a recent article in a recent issue of "The Canadian Nurse" by the editor, Miss Ethel Johns. The doctor's letter read:

"When are you going to work up enough courage to tell the truth about these 'graduation exercises'?"

"The professions, the flowers, the music and, above all, the speeches, remind me of the practice of 'suttee' in India, where the wretched and victim, wreathed in garlands and drugged with mob excitement and flattery, is induced to fling herself into the flames of her husband's funeral pyre. What chance is there for these girls to make a living? Yet the hospitals are turning them out in droves. You must know—Why don't you speak out?"

Miss Johns does not believe the path ahead of the newly-graduated nurse is as terrifying as the latter would indicate. It is generally admitted that a diploma is not in itself a guarantee that one will be able to earn a living in the chosen profession. "However," she declares, "it still gives the right to a place at the starting post and once the barrier falls the race is to the swift."

"...There may be fewer prizes, but they are worth more."

"And those who are left behind in the race? Well, it looks as though they may be more use as though ever before."

"It takes a lot of good workers to man a public utility and that is what nursing will probably become during the active life of this year's graduates."

"The graduating exercises, with the flowers, the music, and even the speeches, Miss Johns thinks, may safely go on as usual since most of those graduating cherish fewer illusions than the speaker who addresses them."

### Keep P.E.I. Potatoes For Seed Purposes

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Wesley Matthew, of York, and speaks for itself:

Dear Madam: You will probably be thinking that some of us West-erners are very ungrateful. I received two bags of potatoes out of the gift car that came here last November. They were good looking potatoes so I decided to keep them for seed. I emptied the bags on Saturday and found your note. The kindness that prompted people so far away to respond to an appeal for help is certainly admirable and I can assure you it is appreciated. Conditions with us are bad enough. We have had four near failures in five years. In 1932 we had a fair crop but almost gave it away. I sold 1300 bus. of wheat at 18 1-2 cents per bushel and it was No. 1. 35 cents per bushel was the best we got for any of it. It is conceded that it costs 60c. per bushel to grow wheat when we get a crop of from 18 to 20 bus. per acre.

We are not nearly so badly off as they are in the big territory along the South side of the province and also in Manitoba and Alberta. From what we know of conditions there it would be hard to exaggerate the conditions. The land was good and for many years good crops were grown and good substantial homes were built. They have had six dry years, practically no crops were produced and the soil drifted so badly that thousands of acres are ruined. In desperation people are taking what they can load on to wagons and are trekking North to where there is bush and they have been getting more notice. It is doubtful if they will be any better off there as the best of the land was all taken years ago, and they

### Calls on Empire To Stand United For World Peace

LONDON, May 22.—(CP)—Celebration of Empire Day this year carries with it a special significance because it is the 25th year of the reign of King George V. Admiral of the Fleet Earl Jellicoe, president of the Empire Day movement says in a special Empire Day message. The message follows:

"The people of the British Empire when celebrating Empire Day this year, will naturally have specially in mind the fact that their Majesties have reigned for 25 years."

"Jubilee rejoicing will be general throughout the Empire and thoughts will turn to the momentous events which have marked these 25 years."

"First and foremost will be the realization of the fact that the different portions of our Empire, scattered all over the world, and comprising many races, are bound together in the persons of their Majesties and the Royal Family, so many members of which have visited all parts of the Empire during the last 25 years and have been welcomed everywhere with enthusiastic loyalty."

"The proofs of unity of Empire so unmistakably manifested during the Great War, and followed up in peace time by such events as Imperial Conference and the Ottawa Conference, will be borne in mind."

"The courageous manner in which the Empire faced the most difficult years of depression will be recalled with pride and satisfaction."

"The wonderful results achieved by the conquest of the air during the last 25 years will be in our minds since this has brought the different parts of the Empire into infinitely closer communications both for passengers and mails, whilst the advance of science in regard to wireless and telephones has made actual speech between all parts of the Empire possible."

"The natural effect of all this should be a yet closer knitting together of the Empire, a strengthening and a keener sense of comradeship. In sending warmest greetings in this special significant year, I pray that the difficulties which still confront us may soon overcome and that, standing together in strength and sympathy, we may keep the Empire that outstanding influence for peace and security that it has been in the past."

### CONFESSES TO KILLING GIRL

BELFAST, May 22.—(AP)—Attorney General Clyde Chappin said Frederick Reynolds, 19, had confessed he had assaulted and killed 16-year-old Eileen Polson whose body was found two miles from her home yesterday.

The girl was misled by her mother and father when she failed to return from school. The mother reported her absence to the school superintendent.

Police found her body under a tree. Her head was crushed.

Thirteen slotted boxes—the Rev. C. C. Curtis, pastor, said he had no fear the number would be unlucky—look the place of the usual collection plates.

As to receipts, Mr. Curtis was not certain they would equal the plate collection at first.

"But I am very sure they will as soon as the congregation becomes used to the new system," he said.

"They were so tired of drives. People held back in Sunday collections because they expected a fresh drive for something in the near future."
