He will visit Boston, then take the Aquatania at New York to Southampton, and after visiting his old home in Edinburgh where his two daughters are training as nurses for the Mission Field will leave for South Africa. 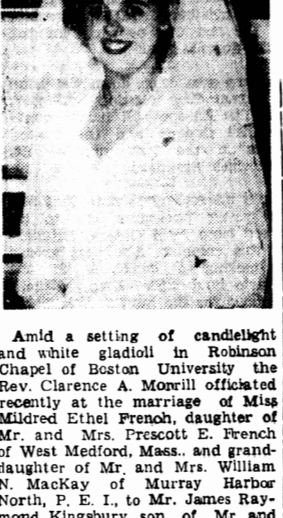
