FIVE MEN IN A PULPIT.

Disgraceful Scene in a Scotch Church Recently—Rival Factions and Throbbating Tempers Much in Evidence.

The troubles of the Free Kirk and the Wee Kirk are straws in the wind compared with the differences which divide the flock of the Dalkeith Evangelical Union Congregational Church.

Morning service recently was notable for the fact that the pulpit contained two rival preachers and all three fighting men, all trying to perform their specific duties at the same time, while the conflicting halves of the congregation sang hymns against each other.

The minister of Dalkeith is the Rev. Robert Dermid Brown. He does not meet with unquestioned approval by the congregation.

There are two doors in Dalkeith Church. The minister holds the keys of one; the malcontents have the other.

The prayer over, Mr. Brown elbowed his way into the pulpit and called for the hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers."

The din was terrific. Three more men stepped into the pulpit. Evidently they were on the side of the minister, for the opposition shouted loudly that three prize fighters had gone up.

"If you are a gentleman, and have any respect, quit this pulpit," said Mr. Brown to his rival.

Mr. Brown delivered an extraordinary tirade, constantly interrupted by laughter, objectionable remarks and the shuffling of feet.

At last he finished and then, as if satisfied with his performance, forbore to eject his rival with the green tie, and stalked out of the church, followed by his bodyguard and his supporters.

PRIMROSE APHORISMS.

Lord Rosebery on the Best Books to Read and Buy.

The Earl of Rosebery, in opening the new Carnegie free library at West Calder, Midlothian, recently, discoursed on books worth reading, and complained that many of the best of them had fallen into neglect.

That knowledge is power, said Lord Rosebery, is a grand truth, but it is not the whole truth.

The man of vigorous life among men will beat the man of books at work and at everything in this world.

Reading is only a partial aid to that knowledge of life which makes the perfection of mankind. You should have your hours of study, but should not, for your hours of study, neglect your hours of action.

There are two further classes of books—the books you borrow and return, and the books you borrow and do not return.

The non-return of books has ended more friendships and terminated more affections than any other cause of which I am cognizant.

The man who borrows one volume of a series of volumes and never returns it is a man who should be treated like vermin—trapped or shot on sight.

My ideal index is that which tells the best book to read on any subject, but my fear is that you will get nobody to frame such an index, because his name would not be safe.

In literature we need one who will act the part of the muezzin on the tower of the mosque, summoning faithful Mahometans to prayer—one who will raise his voice and recall the names of good books and good authors which stand in danger of being forgotten, such as Sydney Smith.

The Great Seal of England.

Something of romance as well as of almost sanctity has always been associated with the Great Seal of England, and many a striking story has been told concerning it. The provision recently, therefore, of the first Great Seal of King Edward VII. is an event of more than merely historical interest; and the Lord Chancellor may assuredly be depended upon to obey both to the letter and in the spirit that statute of Henry VIII. which forbade the "carrying about the Great Seal," inattention to which was largely responsible for costing one of his predecessors the Chancellorship in the autumn of 1834.
