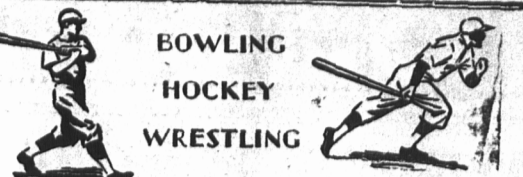

All Major League Teams To See Action Today—If Weather Man Cooperates

NEW YORK, April 17.—If the weather man feels in the right mood—chances are he won't—all 16 major league teams get base-balls in full force tomorrow.

Bad weather ruined half of the usual two-game advanced opening today, forcing the United States' no. 1 right-hander, President Roosevelt, along with New York Yankees and Washington Senators, to the sidelines.

The other half of the curtailed first-day program saw the highly-regarded Cincinnati Reds, the "experts" choice to win the National League pennant, fall apart in the late innings and drop a 7-5 defeat to Pittsburgh Pirates. The defeat was costly, since shortstop Billy Myers was hit on the head by a thrown ball and taken to a hospital with a possible concussion.

Either mild showers or honest-to-gosh rainstorms are predicted for parts of the eight cities planning to get started tomorrow. The Detroit, where Chicago White Sox invade the Tigers' lair, the outlook is "rain or snow." At St. Louis, where the Browns entertain Cleveland Indians, the prediction is "cloudy."

Nearly 200,000 fans are expected to turn out for the four games in each league, with the biggest crowd, some 60,000 or so, anticipated in Yankee Stadium, where the world champions try to get their season started again, with Boston's highly-regarded Red Sox as opposition.

The pennant-winning Chicago Cubs of the National League also open at home, against Cincinnati Reds, and some 25,000 are expected to see big Bill Lee, the "life saving" right hander of the '38 champions, oppose Paul Derringer, St. Louis Cardinals are slated to begin at Pittsburgh; the Phillies at Boston and the Giants and Brooklyn to renew their long-standing feud on the Dodgers' home grounds.

In addition to the New York, Detroit and St. Louis openings in the American League, Washington Senators, their own home opening postponed by wet grounds, journey to Philadelphia to tangle with Connie Mack's lowly Athletics.

Pirates Stage Late Rally To Defeat Reds

CINCINNATI, April 17.—Cincinnati Redlegs almost ended their opening day victory famine today, but finally succumbed 7-5 as Pittsburgh Pirates rapped five runs across the plate in the last two innings of the National Baseball League's centennial campaign in-surreal.

It was the seventh straight opener lost by Cincinnati, and was a tough one for the 30,644 fans to accept, for the Reds had a three-run edge going into the eighth.

The Buccaneers exploded a four-run bomb in that frame, however, at the expense of Bucky Walters, who relieved Johnny Vander Meer in the third. Five hits, including doubles by Vaughn and Young, rolled off the Pirate bats in the big inning.

The Pirates lacked two hits and a sacrifice together for another run in the ninth to clinch the argument.

Vander Meer, of double no-hit fame, was unable to find the plate and lasted less than three innings. Frank McCormick's homer over the left field wall with Gooden aboard in the first spotted Vandy two runs, but the Bucs evened it with two walks and hits by Blanton and Eshar in the third, sending Vander Meer to the showers.

Blanton, although touched for nine hits in seven frames, pitched a steady ball until removed for a pinch-hitter in the eighth. MacE Brown took over the burden and, except for Werber's two-ply shot with one out in the ninth, held the Reds helpless.

Billy Myers, Redleg shortstop, suffered a slight concussion when struck behind the left ear in the second inning by Bruckner's long throw from third as he reached across first after grounding down C. LeClair. He was removed unconscious from the field and taken to a hospital.

Oshawa Generals Rally To Defeat Roamers 4-2 And Win Memorial Cup

TORONTO, April 17.—Oshawa Generals brought the Memorial Cup and the Canadian Junior Hockey Championship back east tonight when they defeated Edmonton Roamers 4-2, with a third period drive that headed off what seemed to be an imminent defeat.

Two brothers, Jud and Norm McAtee, former Stratford, Ont., players, came through with three goals in the spine-tingling session to give Generals their third victory in the best-of-five series.

The red headed Jud scored the first to tie the score, and his brother tallied twice within a minute to wipe out any chance the westerners had of catching the Generals. In winning the prized cup, Oshawa succeeded where they failed last year against St. Boniface.

For two periods and part of the third, Roamers looked the better team. They set up a one-goal lead in the first and matched an Oshawa tally in the second. To most of the 11,226 fans present, it appeared as if Edmonton would level the series and force a fifth game.

The Oshawa pressure began to tell, however, and on a power play started by Danny Daniels, the puck was left loose around the Edmonton goal. Jud McAtee, standing tall, however, got his stick to the off to one side of the net.

The goal inspired Generals to even greater efforts and the Roamers' defence, as rock-bound as any fortress for most of the game, cracked enough for Jud McAtee to slip through for a shot that produced the winning tally.

TORONTO, April 17.—Complete satisfaction with the performance of Toronto Maple Leafs in Stanley Cup finals, despite their loss to Boston Bruins in five games, was expressed tonight by manager Conny Smythe as the Leafs arrived home to be greeted by dismal rain.

"I am more pleased with the Leafs this time than I ever have been with a beaten Toronto team," Smythe declared. "The boys fought and fought and fought. In a way, we were fortunate to get as far as we did, considering our long run of injuries. Naturally we can see where we made mistakes or where we might have grabbed opportunities, but I have no regrets."

That was the general sentiment of the Leafs, some of the younger players set up all night on the train going over the series minutely, but in the end they agreed Boston's National Hockey League champions deserved recognition as world champions.

Doc Romnes came out of last night's 3-1 defeat with a bad charleyhorse. Captain Red Horner suffered two badly bruised and cut toes and Nick Metz bore a couple of cuts on the face.

Most of the Leafs' plaudits were for Eddie Shore, the old Boston bumper who turned back the best of the Toronto players with his magnificent defensive work. Manager Smythe spoke highly of the playmaking of Bill Cowley.

In the face of the team's performance, Smythe wasn't exacting of plans for next season. He admitted there would be "two or three changes."

"Most of the players will linger in town awhile at least. Gordon Drillon may undergo a tonsil operation before leaving for his home at Moncton, N. E. The Metz brothers will drive a new automobile to Wilcox, Sask., while Soalle Turk Broda is expected to march to the altar some time in the summer. Apsis will prepare for his campaign as Conservative candidate in the Federal riding of Brant.
