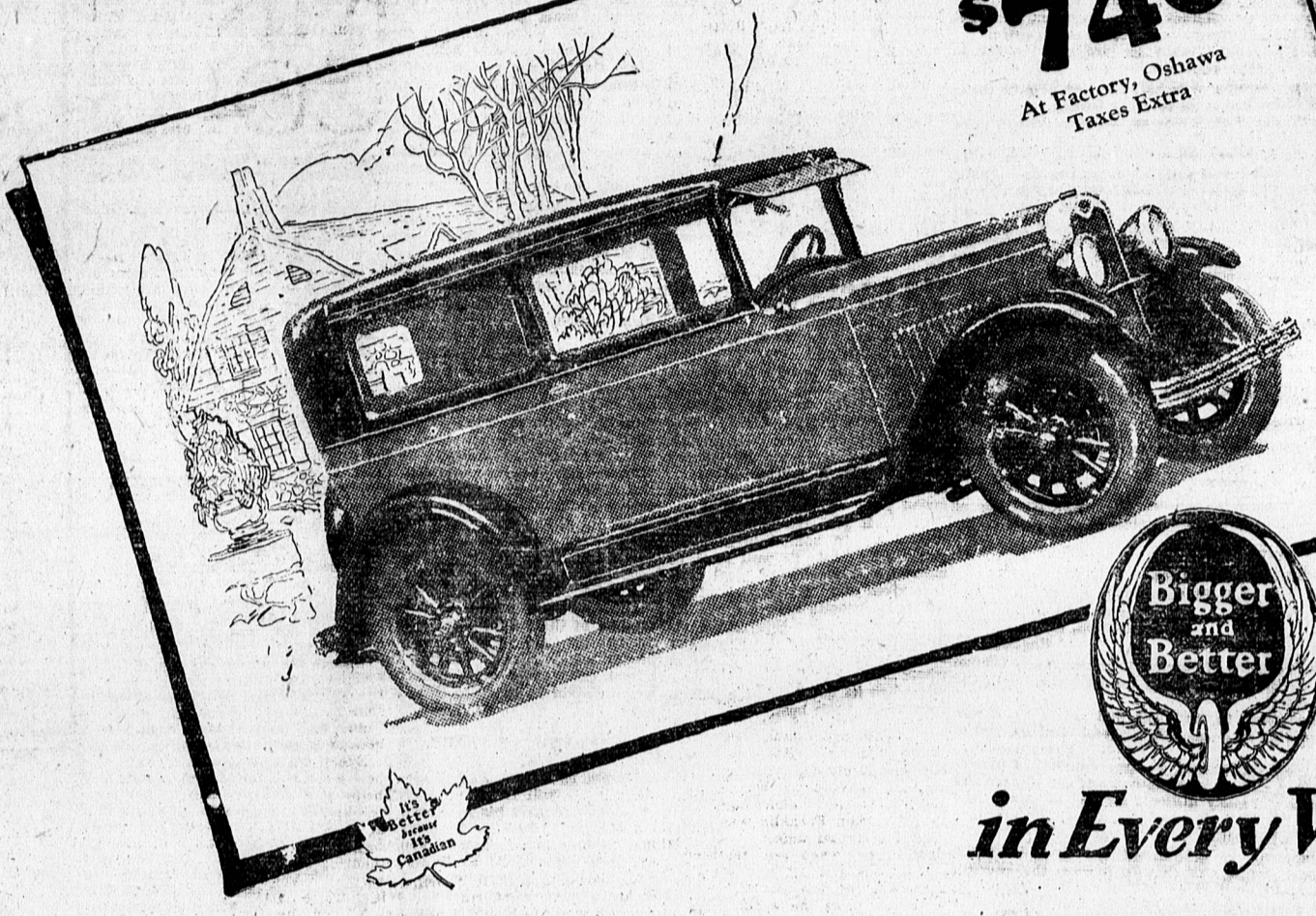

In Memoriam WILLIAM MATTHEWS.

On the last day of the old year, the death took place at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Mobbs, Wheatley River, of William Matthews, after a lingering illness of over two years, during which time he was tenderly nursed by his daughter. He was in the 60th year of his age. His death makes the third in the family in one year and ten months.

He leaves to mourn one son, Wm. E., at Hunter River, and one daughter, Annie, Mrs. John J. Mobbs, Wheatley River; also four grand-children, six brothers and two sisters: Benjamin, Russel and Kell in Minnesota; Seymour and Adeline, New Bedford, Mass.; Mary Ellen, Samuel and John on P. E. Island. The funeral was held on Tuesday the 3rd of January and was largely attended, the service was conducted by the Rev. R. H. Baxter.

There passed peacefully away at the P. E. Island Hospital on Friday, Jan. 18th, after a serious operation, Frances Thorne Brehaut, beloved wife of D. A. Horton of Lower Montague, at the age of sixty-six years. The deceased was the youngest daughter of the late Thomas Brehaut and Janet Glow of Murray Harbor South. At the age of seventeen she left home, and spent the greater part of the next twenty years in Providence, R. She leaves to mourn, her husband, and one son, Cyril, teacher at Stanley Bridge, one sister, Mrs. Lorin Southard, Bridgewater, Mass.; two brothers, Henry A., of Dorchester, Mass.; and James H., of Manchester, N.
